Keyser Wants Coin.

C. A. Keyser went to Chariton County this week to look after his interests in pushing a claim for \$6,600 rebates from the Wabash and two other railroads of Missouri, which he says is due him for grain shipped under the rate law passed in 1905. Mr. Keyser says that he was charged the regular freight rates for 1000 car loads of grain he shipped after the passage of the law and that he is entitled to \$6.60 per car rebate. The three roads made a test case and the supreme court of Missouri decided that the law was valid. The roads will have to pay the rebate. -Fayette Advertiser.
