EUROPEAN WAR

Russians driven far back in Poland but making successful stand against the taking of Warsaw. French and English battleships have taken the Dardanelles straits and nearing Constantinople. If this expedition is successful, 150,000,000 bushels of Russian wheat will be freed for the allies and others. The Turks have checked the advance of the fleet. No material change in the west.


