**Bad Year for Tobacco**

There was but little encouragement for the raising of tobacco, judging of the prices paid this year for the raw product sold on the open market. Last year tobacco brought ten cents and this year from two and one-half to four cents, from 25 per cent. to 40 per cent. of the price a year ago. The best of it brought not more than four cents when sold at the prevailing prices, some who sold considerably earlier and delivered this winter got a little better price, but the fellow who raised a crop that he had to sell did not get much for it. The great reason seems to be the failure of the export trade due to the war. Liverpool is a big importing center and the extremely high maritime freight rates, with the diminution of traffic, due the German submarine raids, has cut down the export business until the crop is hard to move from local warehouses to the usual distributing centers. Quite a few lots have been sold and there is some still held in storage to await a more favorable market. Those who raised the crop last year, and had to sell, lost, rather than made anything on what they raised. One gentleman remarked that the average loss would run several hundred dollars.

**Houchin to St. Louis.**

The Star Clothing Co. owned by James Houchin which has been located at Jefferson City and employed convict labor will move to St. Louis where he expects to employ 2500 girls and men. Houchin made a fortune in his business while employing convict labor. He was formerly a candidate for government and recently told the legislature that they ought to take the management of prison affairs from the hands of politicians.

The frail wings of his machine crumpled and he plunged into the bay with the wreckage. He was drowned and his body recovered by divers in two hours.
