The Storm Area

This country is getting to be a decided storm area. Lucky is the man who has a good barometer, for he can tell when to hike for the storm cellar. Rev. J. L. Routt

The following obituary of Rev. J. L. Routt written by Rev. W. M. Thomson of the church at Armstrong Mo. appeared in the last issue of "The Cumberland Presbyterian Banner."

Rev. John Lewis Routt was born June 8, 1841, in Clark county Kentucky, eight miles north of Winchester, the County seat. He was a son of Benjamin and Mary Routt. He moved from that place with his parents to Randolph County, Missouri, in the year 1850. He was converted and called to preach the Gospel in the ninth year of his age while reading his first lesson in the New Testament. He joined the Cumberland Presbyterian Church at Grand Prairie under the ministrations of the lamented Revs. Levi Haynes and W. F. Manning in 1864, and put himself under the care of Presbytery of McGee in the year 1878 on October 7. He was duly licensed to preach March 26, 1883, and was ordained to the full work of the ministry on April 7, 1889. He was commissioner to the General Assembly from McGee Presbytery in May, 1898, which met at Marshall, Mo. He was married to Martha J. Scratchfield, January 28, 1864. He was elected pastor of the Mt. Hope Church in 1881 and served as pastor for eleven and one half years in succession and was absent one year, then re-elected in 1899 and served three or more years. He was instrumental in building one church in Chariton County, which was named Beulah, in honor of his daughter. He served various other churches among which are Mt. Carmel, Eldad, Bethany, Beulah, Union, Grand Prairie and Salem, at which place he was stricken with paralysis while in the pulpit on the Sabbath day, in April, 1906. From that time until his death, he was a constant sufferer and almost helpless. He was very much beloved by all the people whom he

served and was very successful as a soul winner for Christ, and many will rise up and call him blessed. The memory of him will remain as a happy dream in the lives of his host of friends. He died May 20, at the home of his son, J. H. Routt, near Huntsville Randolph Co., Mo., at the age of 73 years. He leaves his aged and devoted wife and two children namely James H. Routt and Mrs. Beulah staples of Montrose, Colorado; also five grandchildren besides a host of other relatives and other friends. His funeral was preached at Mt. Hope church from Rev. 14:13. "Blessed are the dead which die in the Lord: yea, saith the Spirit, that they rest from their labors and their works do follow them." He was buried in Grand Prairie cemetery. "Life's work well done, Life's race well run, Life's crown well won. And now comes rest and peace. —Rev. W. M. Thomson, pastor, Armstrong, Mo.
