#### Illinois Public Hanging

Joe de Berry, a negro, was hanged at Murphysboro Ill. Saturday for the confessed murder of a white woman. A large stockade was built and 2000 tickets of admission were issued by the sheriff in charge of the job. There was no room inside the enclosure for many more than half the number that came to witness the execution.

Aside from the fact that the condemned was a negro citizen of the state giving the great emancipator to this country, the state where negroes and whites visit and sit at table together, where respectable white people Mr. and Mrs. negroes; where newspapers have been frantic about the execution of negroes in the south for worse crimes than murdering a woman. Aside from all this and more, what moral elevation or deterring of criminals could that locality see in such a public hanging was not instituted for the improvement of public morals and even tho a moral public may be permitted to witness the gruesome sights, the doing so, raises another question.
