Joseph Rutherford, one of Huntsville's eldest and most respected citizens died at six o'clock Sunday afternoon at the family home on Oak Street. He was 72 years of age.

The Huntsville Public Schools opened Monday of last week. Supt. J. A. Burnside and Principal F. P. Laver with the corps of 12 teachers welcomed 489 pupils and many parents who thronged the building.

Clyde Ganion, a ten year old white boy of Moberly found the body of McKinley Curran, a negro, 22 years old near the Wabash track at Brunswick. It is thought the negro was murdered.

In the case of Burton vs. the Wabash Railway Company, in which the plaintiff was suing for damages as a result of the death of a relative who was killed on a railroad crossing at Huntsville several months ago, the jury in circuit court at Huntsville returned a verdict for the plaintiff assessing his damages at \$900.

S. M. Doyle, 77 years of age, was struck by a Katy, train on Thursday evening and instantly killed at Rockville. His two nephews W. O. and E. O. Doyle of Moberly went to Rockville to attend the funeral.

A marriage license was issued last week to J. O. Pollard, of Madison and Miss Alta Young of Clark.

Joseph J. Kribbs, one of the best known residents of Moberly died at his home last Friday night. He was 65 years old.

Mr. and Mrs. J. E. Myers of Huntsville have filed suit against the Wabash Railway Co. The suit resulting from the death last February of Wayne and Alvin Myers while on their way from school they were struck by a Wabash train and instantly killed. The suit is for \$3000.
