## Fattening Poultry

Chickens may be taken from the range, fed expensive feeds and sold for an economical gain, according to H. L. Kempster. Tests have proved that the birds will gain approximately 23 per cent in twelve to fourteen days feeding. The grain required to each pound of gain of the chicken was three and one-half pounds or about eight cents.

The chickens were confined in coops two by two and one-half feet square with wire bottoms. Slaters were placed across the front permitting them to feed from the trough outside. The ration consisted of corn meal, 7 pounds; shorts, 3 pounds; bran, 1 pound. To each pound was added two pounds of sour milk. This wet mixture was fed twice daily. The confinement encourages gain through lack of exercise and causes the flesh to soften making the meat more delectable and luscious.
