The order coming thru publicity director Creel and at the instance of Genl. Pershing prohibiting further disclosure of the addresses of our soldiers killed or wounded or otherwise disabled in France will cause many an uneasy hour to parents and friends of the unfortunate. The names only will be allowed to be printed, and since there are hundreds of John Jones and Jim Smiths in the army from all parts of the U. S. the mere publication of the name will stir up hundreds in some instances until the real identity of the killed or injured has been learned. The order was brought about by the French commanders believing that the publication of the names and addresses was of value to our enemies and it goes without saying that whatever Genl. Pershing deems for the best for our cause should obtain until proven otherwise. The relatives of next of kin of all killed and wounded will have information on the subject as soon as it can be forwarded to them. It occurs to us that it might be well to publish nothing rather than just enough to cause thousands needless suffering because of apprehension that the victim is their relative but what ever is ordered by the war authorities should be considered as final and lived up to.
