Lord Northcliffe, the most powerful newspaper man in the world, is dividing his attention between ousting Lloyd George and suppressing British gibes at American soldiers. Northcliffe put Lloyd George in the highest office in England and it will be astonishing if he does not put him out, now that they are outwardly and inwardly at outs, but the situation really most impressive to the great journalist is the attitude of the Englishmen towards the Americans, especially her soldier boys.

It is easily understood why U. S. soldiers are not returned via England. Multiplied thousands of men will never know what the British Isles look like, much less than have any knowledge of them internally because of the necessity of keeping an American soldier distant from a place he would most surely be called on to resent an affront if not direct insult and attack.

From the time of the signing of the armistice the English soldier sneered "Now the Yanks will claim they have won the war" and the feeling which prompted the jealous British soldier to utter a covert insinuation against what he assumed to be false claims is prevalent on the island. It is this that Northcliffe would suppress, feeling that it will inevitably lead to open hostility between U. S. and Johnny Bull if persisted in by Englishmen, and knowing that a break between the two great countries would be a disastrous sequel to the accomplishments of the peace conference. But with the acception of the Northcliffe papers, every powerful paper in England is either hostile or strangely silent on American sentiments.

It is claimed in an editorial in one of the strongest journals in London that "not president Wilson but Balfour brot America into the war." But the feeling in

America in many quarters not deeply interested in perpetuation of military preparedness to keep factories engaged in manufacturing of war materials for profiteering at the expense of the American public, packers fat off bacon consumers and food stuff canners lolling in luxury, is decidedly against maintaining much of an army at home, much less a considerable number of our boys in foreign lands to enforce the commercial interests of any other nation or nations, the U. S. to foot the bills and wail over casualties. If Mr. president or congress wants to learn how the country generally from which is drawn the soldier boys and the cash to foot the bills, necessary and spectacular, feels about an alliance with England and France or mixing further in European economic or political affairs, either or both can do so easily by submitting the propositions to the people at the polls. But that is a method for arriving at the proper course for congress to pursue which has been defunctus mortua since the effect of the slogan "he kept us out of the war" begun to be felt in its real application to a people living under our constitution.
