SEVEN DAYS OF NEWS THE WORLD OVER

Peace Notes.

The occupation area has been extended from Duisburg to stations all along the railroad running from Duisburg to Essen to within two and a half miles of Essen. The central freight yard at Wedau, the largest in the Ruhr district, and Mulheim station are guarded by French troops. Dusseldorf is quiet.

The Russo-Polish treaty was signed recently, says a dispatch to the London Times from Riga. The dispatch adds that the treaty is to be ratified at Minsk within thirty days. Under the treaty, 30 million gold rubles are to be paid to Poland within twelve months.

The reply of France, Italy, Japan and Great Britain to the appeal of Austria for assistance has been prepared. The four countries agree to postpone payment of the sums to which they are entitled under the treaty of St. Germain, and also payment of the capital and interest on advances made to Austria since the armistice, in order to avert starvation in that country.

Rene Viviani, formerly premier of France, on his visit to the United States will go prepared to ask on behalf of the council of the League of Nations whether the United States government will not enter the League of Nations provided article 10 is stricken from the covenant of the league.

Great Britain and Russia have signed a trade agreement. The document marked the first assumption of commercial arrangements with an allied power. Russia made important concessions, the most notable being an agreement to cease bolshevist propaganda outside of Russia.

A successful counter-revolution has occurred in Armenia and Bolshevik invaders have been driven from power, said messages received by the Near East relief. The cables added that a new government had been set up in Erivan and now controlled a wide area of the country.

General Gaucher, commander of the occupational forces at Dusseldorf ordered the merchants of the occupied area not to further increase prices. They are cautioned against creating the impression that the higher prices charged for clothing and foodstuffs are due to the allied occupation.

A preliminary peace treaty was signed in Riga by the Russian soviet and Polish peace delegates, says a dispatch to the London Times from Riga. The final terms will be signed later, the dispatch added.

Washington.

The case against Erwin Bergdoll, brother of Grover Cleveland Bergdoll, under sentence of five years imprisonment for evading the draft, is to be reopened at the request of the government and a new hearing will be held in the district court at Kansas City, Kas., probably within a week.

Gen. John J. Pershing, speaking before a crowd which packed Madison Square Garden at one of the greatest patriotic demonstrations since the signing of the armistice, bitterly denounced persons of foreign birth who seek the freedom of this country to spread "political and warlike propaganda," to weaken the ties of friendship between the United States and her allies in the late war.

Secretary Denby will not rescind former-Secretary Daniels's much discussed order abolishing the wine mess on board naval vessels. The naval secretary said recently that leaving national prohibition out of consideration, he was heartily in accord with Mr. Daniels on the subject.

For the first time since the United States entered the war, the White House recently was the scene of a reception to the diplomatic corps. The President and Mrs. Harding received their guests, numbering about 250, in the blue room.

How to boost American business at home and abroad was the principal subject of discussion at the meeting of President Harding with his cabinet the other day. The President took an optimistic view of the present period of business depression.

Domestic.

Five persons were burned to death when a rear Pullman car on the Denver & Rio Grande Railroad caught fire at about 2 o'clock in the morning between Pueblo and Walsenburg. The origin of the fire is undetermined.

The Federal trade commission in a report submitted to the Department of Justice following a protracted investigation of the stationers' trade recommends that charges of operating a trust be brought against the Chicago Stationers' Association, the National Association of Stationers and all affiliated bodies.

Approximately 622 million dollars is available for road and bridge construction and maintenance this year, the bureau of agriculture announced the other day.

Figures made public by the interstate commerce commission disclosed. In the three months ending with September 30, 1920, railroad wages amounted to \$1,052,109,451, an increase of \$251,045,513 over the preceding quarter.

A reduction of 35 per cent in freight rates on livestock between points Northwest, Southwest and West of the Mississippi have been granted, according to a telegram received in Denver from Washington.

President Harding has named Secretary of Labor Davis, Secretary of Commerce Hoover and Secretary of Agriculture Wallace to sit as a mediation commission to hear both sides of the dispute between the packers and their employes.

Representatives of packing house workers who will attend the conference at Washington to discuss methods of adjusting the stockyards wage controversy will be empowered by their constituents to call an immediate strike if their terms are not granted.

Vandals recently destroyed the interior of the Holy Rosary Catholic church in Denver. Using crowbars and other heavy implements, the invaders destroyed the altar, tore down the cross and accomplished other ruin estimated in excess of \$6,000.

The plan to divert immigrants from the cities and industrial centers to co-ordinate agencies of the departments of interior, agriculture and labor to place the new-comers on small farms have been announced by W. W. Husband, commissioner general of immigration.

Southwest.

A 2-year-old child was probably fatally injured, several other persons suffered minor injuries, and several houses, barns and a school house were blown from their foundations in a severe wind and hail storm which swept over Jackson County, Arkansas.

W. R. Calcott, candidate for United States senator on the Nonpartisan League ticket last fall, was killed and two other persons severely injured when a motor car "running wild" struck them at a street junction in Denver.

Clara Smith Hamon was acquitted at Ardmore, Ok., of a charge of having murdered Jake L. Hamon, Republican national committeeman from Oklahoma and millionaire railroad and oil promoter. The jury was out only 40 minutes.

For the first time in the history of Pittsburg County, Ok., a negro received the nomination for a place on a ticket, the third ward, almost solidly negro, of Harthorne, a small town near McAlester, giving the place of alderman to Dr. F. L. Cook, negro, in the primary.

Roy Burkes, 24 years old, who shot and killed Prof. George Bruner of Oklahoma City because the professor insisted on paying attention to Burke's wife and threatened him, was found not guilty of murder by a jury in the district court at Guthrie.

Brownie Tuttle, negro, charged with assault on a white woman near Hope, Ark., was taken from the Hope city jail at 7:30 o'clock at night by a mob of about three hundred and hanged about fifty feet from the jail.

Foreign.

The British house of commons passed the third reading of the reparations bill. The bill provides for a levy of 50 per cent on German goods, but this provision will not be effective until March 31. After the house of commons had passed the measure it was read for the first time in the house of lords.

A German syndicate has offered 6 million pesos to the Mexican government for a large tract of land in the state of Coahuila for colonization purposes, it was reported recently.

The French ambassador in Berlin, Charles Laurent, has been instructed to inform the German government that France is aware of the concentration of a large number of German troops on the frontier of Upper Silesia.

Kronstadt has surrendered to the Soviet forces. This announcement is made by the revolutionary committee of Kronstadt, which has arrived in Finland accompanied by 800 soldiers. Before retreating from Kronstadt the revolutionists blew up the warships Petropavlovsk and Sebastopol.

Embarkation by Japan on an elaborate program of naval aviation is to be expected, in the opinion of officials in Washington, by the recent activity of the Japanese government in the purchase of airplanes in Europe and in the endeavor to enlist the expert advice of British naval fliers.

Dr. Alfredo Zayas y Alfonso was elected to the presidency of Cuba in the partial elections held recently. In an interview, the president-elect declared he expected to have sufficient support in the national congress to offset the threatened Liberal congressional strike.

Dr. Walter Simons, the foreign minister, speaking before a committee of the economic council of the reichstag said: "We are pretty well agreed that sooner or later we shall enter again into negotiations with the entente."

WOULD UNIFY ALL RAILROAD LINES

Holders of Securities See Central Control as the Only Salvation for Them

TO ASK CONSENT OF CONGRESS

Plan of Owners to be Submitted to Chairman Cummins of Senate Interstate Commerce Committee.

Washington.—Co-ordination of the facilities and service of the railroads of the country under strict government supervision is proposed by the National Association of Owners of Railway Securities as a way out of the present transportation crisis.

The plan will be submitted to Chairman Cummins of the senate interstate commerce committee. S. Davies Warfield, president of the association, announced that representatives of his organization would appear later before the committee to urge adoption.

Says Plan Means Lower Rates. Mr. Warfield says the plan will insure an annual saving of millions of dollars, increase facilities and service and lower railway fares and rates. He adds that American transportation has outgrown the system under which it now operates and warns that the railroads must recognize that only drastic measures on their part will save them from being swallowed up in the "demoralization that government operation and after-war adjustments have brought upon them."

Can't Hold Present Gait. "Unless intensive economical methods in railway administration are adopted," he continues, "there is no alternative but government operation, followed by government ownership, although the country has given overwhelming evidence of being opposed to it."

The proposed plan is supplemental to provisions of the transportation act permitting regional consolidation of physical properties by the interstate commerce commission.

Certain consolidation of railroads are necessary, Mr. Warfield says, "but an emergency now exists, and the public is entitled to more immediate and substantial benefits than can be derived from the great physical consolidations of railway properties."

Through a National Railway Service. The proposed co-ordination would be brought about through a national railway service, to be organized by an act of congress, and which also would be an agency to purchase cars and other equipment to be furnished to the railways without profit.

AN EMPORIA HOTEL BURNED

A Guest from Kansas City and One From Wichita Missing in Whiteley Fire.

Emporia, Kas.—Following a check-up of guests at the Whiteley hotel here, which was destroyed by fire, two persons still remain unaccounted for. First reports placed the list of those missing at eight. W. R. Boss, one of the guests who was thought to have perished in the flames, has been arrested, charged with setting fire to the hostelry.

E. T. Jay, deputy state fire marshal here, arrested Boss after evidence was collected showing that Boss had thrown a cigar stub on the floor of his room before leaving the room to go out on the street. H. B. Mason of Wichita, who occupied the room next to Boss's, is still unaccounted for.

Because of the intense heat efforts to search the ruins for the missing guests have been unsuccessful. Six persons were injured in escaping from the burning hotel. Within eight minutes after the alarm was turned in the building was a mass of flames. Several were injured when the fire escape ropes burned, dropping them to the ground. Those listed as missing are J. A. Daniels of Kansas City, Kas., and H. B. Mason of Wichita.

CATYLE THIEVES IN COMBINE

Kadoka, S. D.—A posse of three sheriffs left here recently with an order to bring back William George dead or alive. A warrant has been issued charging George with cattle stealing.

Hundreds of thousands of dollars' worth of stock is said to have been stolen by George and his associates in the last few years.

Existence of an "underground" system extending into Nebraska, where the stock was disposed of, is said to have been made known after an alleged companion of George's broke through the ice of the Missouri River while driving cattle across.

Offer Blood to a Comrade. New Britain, Conn.—More than a score of world veterans presented themselves at a hospital here and begged to be allowed to give some of their blood to save the life of a comrade suffering from anemia.

No Monte Carlo In Mexico. Paris.—The Prince of Monaco, who will leave for the United States early in April, denied that he was going to establish an "American Monte Carlo" on a Mexican island just South of Point Isabel, Tex.
