DR. PUTMAN BUYS GROUND FOR HOSPITAL BUILDING

A new \$25,000 hospital building is to be started on the lots east of the First National Bank Building. Dr. Putman has just closed the deal for four lots, comprising a tract of ground 100x150 feet which he bought of Geo. F. Gucker. The location is a good one, on a quiet street close to the business section of town and the railroad station. Plans have been drawn by Earl Hulse of Hutchinson, Kansas, and will be on display at the First National Bank, next week. The building will front the north and will set back from the sidewalk, allowing room for a driveway. It will have a frontage of 75 feet, with a depth of 50 feet, and will be two stories high with a basement. The building will be constructed of brick, trimmed with stone. There will reception rooms, operating, sterilizing and antiseptic rooms, and about fifteen rooms for patients.

Dr. Putman has had the building of a hospital under consideration for a long time, and the present enterprise is the outcome of careful thought and consideration. It will be large enough for the needs of this city for years, but there is ample

Marceline has outgrown our present hospital facilities. Mercy hospital has accomplished much. Its value is thoroughly appreciated by the people of the entire community. And it remains for the business men and the public spirited citizens to lend substantial encouragement to Dr. Putman in this undertaking. A considerable outlay of money is involved in the construction of a twenty-five room, modern hospital building. On account of the public nature of the enterprise stock will be for sale to the citizens. This stock has a sentimental value, aside from its intrinsic worth. Every dollar's worth

of stock brought adds to the value of Marceline. Leaving out the money-earning feature of the stock it has community value that is hard to estimate.

The need of a first-class hospital in Marceline is too well understood to demand explanation. The city with its 5,000 population has a large tributary country, in addition to the location of the Missouri Division of the Atchison, Topeka and Santa Fe Railway and the mines. The present hospital is doing splendid work, but is necessarily handicapped.

New hospitals are going up all over the country, among contemplated projects being one at Brookfield, Mo. None are in better hands or have a more gratifying outlook than the hospital planned for East Howell.—Marceline Journal-Mirror.
