

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**THE BOONEVILLE BRIDGE**

Construction of a bridge on the Old Trails Highway at Booneville is assured. A contract has been awarded at an estimated cost in the neighborhood of \$800,000.

The new bridge is being financed by the Old Trails Bridge Corporation. It was organized in Booneville and stock sold in that city, Marshall, Lexington and Columbia. Four hundred thousand dollars for the erection of the structure was obtained in this manner.

Booneville voted \$50,000 bonds for the building of the Booneville side approach to the structure. The approach, of re-inforced concrete, will be 564 feet in length. The total length of the bridge will be 3,128 feet. This includes 1,820 feet in the river section which will consist of three riveted steel spans 420 feet each and two steel spans of 280 feet each. The longer spans are supported on pneumatic concrete piers, sunk to bedrock. The two shorter spans will rest on concrete piers founded on piling. The opposite approach, which is in Howard county, will be of piling and earth and connect with a macadam highway.

The structure will provide a highway twenty feet wide and have a clearance above the standard high-water stage of the river of fifty-five feet, suitable, engineers say, to allow the passing of any steamboat navigating the stream.

The contract for the building of the steel work of the bridge proper was awarded to the Mount Vernon Bridge Company of Mount Vernon, Ohio. The approximate cost of this part is \$198,000. The substructure contract was awarded the Missouri Valley Bridge and Iron Company, of Leavenworth, Kan. The contracts call for completion of the bridge December 31, 1922.

**ERMITES DESTROY PROPERTY**

The aid of entomology from the Missouri College of Agriculture has been requested by Albert Lybarger, a farmer living near Osborn in DeKalb County, whose property is being destroyed by termites or white ants. Here is an instance, according to A. C. Burrill, extension entomologist, where the termites have seriously damaged houses, barn, granaries, cribs, outbuildings, trees and fences. To save an unusually good set of farm improvements, Mr. Lybarger has already resorted to fumigation, raising buildings upon elevated foundations and other measures recommended by the entomologists.

Paint is also a repellent against the termites since it protects the wood from moisture. Wet weather encourages the depredations of this pest; and anything to keep the moisture from penetrating the wood will serve to decrease the danger of damage by this insect. Creosote applied to timbers next to the ground will prove helpful.

The termite has developed into a menace to property in only a few Missouri localities, but farmers everywhere can well afford to maintain a sharp lookout. Farmers' Bulletin 759 from the U. S. Department of Agriculture contains suggestions for the control of this pest.

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**ASOLINE PRICES WILL SOON SKYROCKET**

Washington, D. C. Further increases in gasoline prices will be made effective soon in all parts of the country, it was learned at the interior department. These increases may total 4 or 5 cents per gallon by the middle of June, it was stated. This is in addition to increases during the past six weeks, ranging from 4 to 6 cents on the gallon. Practically every oil concern of importance is pledged to increase prices during the summer and fall months, it was stated. A "gentleman's agreement" is said to exist for raising the price to 30 cents a gallon during the next two weeks. Attorney General Daugherty has promised to make a thorough investigation.
