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STATE LEGISLATURE UNDER CONTROL OF THE DEMOCRATS

Incomplete returns from the various counties of Missouri in Tuesday's election indicate control of both branches of the General Assembly by the Democrats. Returns insure control of the House by the Democrats and the indications point to the election of 12 out of 17 senators.

In a tabulation of votes made Wednesday night the Associated Press gave the following as the probably victors:

That control of the House has passed to the Democrats is shown beyond doubt by the election of Democrats in a large majority of the counties. This was first proved by the returns from such counties as Jasper, Barry, Jefferson and Monticau which sent Democrats.

Among the number who will come for the session are Thomas J. Roney, from Jasper county who has previously served and was at one time Democrat floor leader.

Success of the Democrats in gaining control will result in a spirited contest for the speakership between Oak Hunter of Randolph, C. M. Edwards of Dunklin, Garnett Peters of Clay, H. O. Maxey of Bates and Charles Sutton of Reynolds. All have heretofore announced their candidacy. D. L. Bates of Shannon County is the only avowed candidate for floor leader.

Control of the Senate by the Democrats will result in power to appoint committees being taken from Lieutenant-Governor Hiram Lloyd, known as the Senate Czar. The majority in the upper branch will be by but one vote with a total of 19 out of 24 members.

JAPS ARE NOT WHITE SUPREME COURT RULES

Washington, D. C.—Japs are not white within the meaning of the American law and are not entitled to citizenship in the United States, the supreme court held today.

The high court affirmed a decision of the California circuit court of appeals in a test case of Takao Ozawa, of Honolulu, who claimed that he was "white" and was eligible for naturalization as an American citizen.

At the same time the court upheld the Washington supreme court in denying citizenship to Takaji Yamashita and Charles Hio Kono, of Seattle.

The decision held that the two Japanese were not entitled to naturalization under United States laws and therefore could not enter a business partnership.

PRESIDENT HARDING DESIGNATES NOV. 30 AS THANKSGIVING DAY

Declaring that the estate of the nation "presents very much to justify a nation-wide and most sincere testimony of gratitude for the bounty which has been bestowed on us," President Harding, in his annual Thanksgiving proclamation calls upon the American people to observe Thursday, November 30, "as a day of thanksgiving, supplication and devotion."

The text of the proclamation follows: "By the President of the United States of America.

"In the beginning of our country the custom was established by devout fathers of observing annually a day of thanksgiving for the bounties and protection which divine Providence had extended throughout the year. It has become to be perhaps the most characteristic of our national observances, and as the season approaches for its annual recurrence it is fitting formally to direct attention to this ancient institution of our people and to call upon them again to unite in its appropriate celebration.

"The year which now approaches its end has been marked in the experience of our nation, by a complexity of trials and triumphs, of difficulties and of achievements, which we must regard as our inevitable portion in such an epoch as that through which all mankind is moving. As we survey the experience of the passing twelve months we shall find that our estate presents very much to justify a nation-wide and most sincere testimony of gratitude for the bounty which has been bestowed upon us. Though we have lived in the shadows of the hard consequences of great conflict, our country has been at peace and has been able to contribute toward the maintenance and perpetuation of peace in the world. We have seen the race of mankind makes gratifying progress on the way to permanent peace, toward order and restored confidence in its highest destiny.

"For the divine guidance which has enabled us in growing fraternity with other people, to attain so much of progress; for the bounteous yield which has come to us from the resources of our soil and industry, we owe our tribute of gratitude and with it our acknowledgment of the duty and obligation to our own people and to the unfortunate, the suffering, the distracted of other lands. Let us, in all humility acknowledge how great is our debt to the Providence which has generously dealt with us and give devout assurance of unselfish purpose to play a helpful and ennobling part in human advancement. It is much to be desired that in rendering homage for the blessings which have come to us we should earnestly testify our continued and increasing aim to make our own great fortune a means of helping and serving as best we can, the cause of humanity.

"Now therefore, I, Warren G. Harding, President of the United States of America, do designate Thursday, the thirtieth day of November, as a day of Thanksgiving, supplication and devotion. I recommend that the people gather at their family altars and in their houses of worship to render thanks to God for the bounties they have enjoyed and to petition that these may be continued in the year before us.

"In witness whereof, I have hereunto set my hand and caused the seal of the United States to be affixed.

"Done at the City of Washington this second day of November in the year of our Lord one thousand nine hundred and twenty-two and of the independence of the United States of America the one hundred forty-seventh.

"WARREN G. HARDING."

IS SUMMONED TO APPEAR BEFORE FEDERAL COURT

Prosecuting Attorney Redic O'Bryan received notice Saturday to come to St. Louis, November 18 to appear before district court of the U. S. for the northern division of the judicial district and there to answer a bill of complaint of the Wabash, filed against him November 2, before Hon. C. B. Farris.

This summons grows out of a suit against the Wabash instituted by employees for an alleged violation of the act of the General Assembly calling for the erection of sheds to protect outside workers on freight and passenger cars.

This case was recently tried at Macon and the decision was in favor of the Wabash. The official notice says that Mr. O'Bryan has threatened to bring a number of criminal proceedings against the plaintiff for the alleged violation of this act, and the attorney is asked to appear before court and show cause, "if you have any" why the temporary injunction granted by the court should not be made permanent.
