### FARM NOTES.—INTENDED FOR LAST WEEK

Annual Meeting Report  
The annual meeting of the Charlton County Farm Bureau was held at the court house last Friday, December 1st. There was a fairly good attendance from nearly all parts of the county, and we believe more interest was shown in Farm Bureau work than usual. The forenoon meeting was

given over almost entirely to a discussion of plans for work in 1923.

A committee of local men together with Mr. Baker, of the Missouri University, had outlined some work for this country, and this report was presented the membership for their criticism and approval. There was a good interest shown and the discussion was lively which shows that the membership of the Farm Bureau when given a chance is keenly interested in what the County Agent is doing.

In the afternoon the County Agent made a report of the past work, and officers were elected for the coming year. Twelve names were presented by a Nominating Committee and these were voted on by ballot with the following results, seven men elected for Executive Committee, the names are as follows: W. R. Heehler, Clarence Garhart, Selba Littrell, Will Richards, J. H. Stoner, Freeman Kincaid and Fred Lamb. This committee will meet Wednesday December 6th, for organization purposes and for other routine business.

Dairy Meetings  
We have made arrangements for a series of meetings to be held at various places in Charlton county the week commencing December 18th, for the purpose of encouraging farmers who are producing cream or milk. We will be assisted by Mr. D. L. Hamour, who is a specialist in this line and we know will be able to help us with our dairy problems. This work will include selection of dairy

cows, building up the dairy herds, feeding for milk and cream production, and etc. We have not yet made out a complete schedule for the week and when you read this if you would like for us to come to your community for a meeting we hope you will call the Farm Bureau officer at once for a date.

Chinch Bugs Gone to Bed  
The chinch bugs are now mostly gone into winter quarters, and while we may forget them for a time they will no doubt waken up in the spring and give us plenty to think about along in June. Now there is a way to prevent at least a part of the worry next June, and that is by pulling the cover off these bugs and exposing them to winter conditions. The best way to do this is to burn all trash and weeds, bunch grass, and etc., along the edges of fields and ditches just as soon as possible.
