DENVER BANDITS PULL OFF DARING HOLD-UP TODAY

Denver, December 18.—Bandits escaped with currency estimated at \$200,000 today, when they held up a federal reserve bank car in front of the United States mint here.

One of the guards on the bank car was killed.

Three bandits carried out the daring raid.

The robbers with handkerchiefs covering their faces stopped the car in front of the mint and held up the driver and guard. They seized the \$200,000 in currency, leaped into the large curtained touring car and sped away. One of the mint guards opened fire and riddled the federal reserve car which he believed contained the robbers. The fire was returned by the bandits and one of the guards of the federal reserve car who had been forced to abandon the machine was shot and instantly killed.

The car had just been loaded at the mint when the bandits drew up in their automobile. The daring hold-up and the gun battle was witnessed by scores of passersby. The door of the mint was riddled with bullets.

## Children Cry FOR FLETCHER'S CASTORIA

"GREASY SPOON" WAS RAIDED LAST NIGHT

Joseph Johnson's noted place, known as the Greasy Spoon, was raided last night and this morning found Joe and three other men in the court house cell while the officers had the liquor evidence in the case.

For several nights the officers say, the sounds of revels had caused complaint against this place and last night the clamor was loud enough to be heard on the south side of Reed street. Constable Branham and his deputy, Elmer Guthrie, going to investigate, saw a drink sold over the counter. They went inside. The proprietor resented their coming and seeing that they would need help, Mr. Branham went out and phoned to Sheriff Milam and his Deputy Harry Polson, who were on the scene in a few minutes.

Each officer got a man, but each resisted being taken. Besides Johnson, those taken into custody were: Tunce Davis, Charles Hartman and Joe Reed. While the argument between the officers and men was in progress, Harry Polson looked over the counter and saw a basket containing liquor. In this were three full pint bottles, two half pints and another partly empty bottle. This was confiscated.

This is the third time Johnson has been arrested for similar offenses. At the October term of circuit court he was given a sentence of a \$500 fine. A stay of execution was granted on \$300 of this penalty until the February term of court.

Prosecuting Attorney O'Bryan today filed information against the men for the circuit court, and hopes to close this place of bad repute for at least a year as one of the penalties for repeated law violation.

Information was filed this afternoon against Johnson, Davis and Reed for selling and possessing intoxicating liquor, and against Hartman for possessing liquor.

Johnson and Davis were placed under \$2000 bond this afternoon to appear before the circuit court December 21.—Moberly Democrat.
