In Memory of My Departed Friend, A. M. Lence.

Before the power of death whose dictates we cannot understand, we pause and question, why art thou; and wherefore. We marvel at the mystery that rides into the citadels of our hearts annihilating the fortresses of our happiness, and taking from its garrisons a relation or a friend to enlist as a prisoner from whose hostage there is no ransom. And thus does interant death wonder on, harboring no worldly condition or circumstances, yielding neither to the influences of mundane power, or earthly opulence, hesitating not before the unnoticed but or the imposing edifice whose spires and turrets reach far into the cerulean vault of heaven, reducing to a common equality he who has convulsed the world with his greatness, and he who was born, lived and died unknown. Like the wave of the ocean, it sweeps along, taking everything in its path, and leaving behind the melancholy legacies of sorrow and grief.

Two days prior to his end, I visited him, and though the awful shadow was upon him, in his beautiful way, characteristic of a nature always courteous, he bid me be seated, and in appreciative recognition of my visit, gently pressed my hand. This was his manner with the icy folds of death already encircling him; this was his manner in joyous life. A friend and companion from childhood, his name will not sink from recollection like the pebble, that makes a momentary impression upon the water that yields to its weight, but shall linger a cherished thought for evermore.

He sleeps well on the land of his birth that he loved so well; nothing now can disturb him; nothing does he fear; he is beyond the pale of human voice, he hears not the sob and the moan he has left behind, nor sees he the tear his sorrowing friend drops upon his bier. He fears no more the heat of the sun. Nor the furious winters rages. He, his earthly task has done And gone and taken his wages.
