"The people he loves."

It has been said by the half organ of little Padre Gallegos that he loves the people of New Mexico very much. It, however, did not tell how he manifested that love towards the objects of his affection. This is regarded as a great oversight on the part of the half organ, and it has rather confounded the people. They have known the little Padre many years and never discovered the disinterested love he has borne towards them throughout that whole time, until the marvel of wisdom which tries to conduct his half organ found it out and told them of it. Was such wisdom ever known on earth since the days of Solomon? But it is so profound, and its method of spreading itself before the public is so mysterious that its practical value is very small. Hence it is, that ninety nine out of every hundred do not comprehend how the little Padre loves the people, nor will they ever understand it without a full and unreserved explanation from the half organ. We know that when the necessity for an explanation is properly appreciated by the little Padre's half organ, it will be forthcoming, and least it should be in want of facts, notwithstanding its astounding wisdom and perspicacity, we will here give some data upon which a most triumphant vindication of his pure love of the people can be established. This we do because we feel it is necessary that the people should be extricated from the sea of astonishment into which they were plunged by the naked announcement of the ardent love which the little Padre bears them.

The little Padre was once upon a time a Priest, and wore the robes of the holy office. It was then that his love for the people began to sprout, and during his ministrations his love grew rapidly, if not desistedly. With the increase of his love for the people his love of worldly gain also increased and the two combined made him a wondrous lover. From the sacred desk he preached his love to his flock. With the iron hand of the despot he extorted from them the tithes, the first fruits, the fees for indulgences, charges for marriages &c, and thereby gratified his love of worldly gain. He loved his flock and church into poverty and himself into wealth. With these loving works he succeeded exceedingly well and prospered to his heart's content. But the people did not reciprocate his love. It was not the kind of love that makes "two seals with but a single thought; two hearts that beat as one." They tired of his love and the Bishop stepped him of his sacerdotal fowls, turned him loose upon the world and relieved the people of his parish from the extortions and immorality of the little Padre.

After this he turned office seeker and with the transformation from an unworthy Priest to the demagogue his love for the people increased most remarkably. It is natural for the demagogue to love the people, and to tell them so too. But the little Padre only succeeded in a small way in politics. By the practice of fraud he secured himself a certificate of election as Delegate to Congress over Gov. Lane. The fraud which was at that time practiced was notorious and was not exposed because Gov. Lane would not take the trouble to contest the election. When he ran in opposition to Mr. Otero he did the same thing. But then the fraud was exposed and he cast out of Congress. Thus the half organ may see that the little Padre loved the people then, but that he had no confidence in the people's love for him and he resorted to the means we have just mentioned to demonstrate that they did love him. After the exposure of these political recalcitancies he did not cease to love the people, but his ambition did not want to high. He found that the love the people had for him would not make him a distinguished member of Congress and he subsided into a county demagogue and looked after the small offices which were not sought for by others. By this wise sort of political strategy he was elected to the House of Representatives several times when he had no opposition.

As a member of the House he of course continued to love the people, and so demonstrated by the often repeated assertions contained in his windy harangues. By his acts he did not prove it so clearly. He has been in favor of the passage of a law authorizing the imprisonment of poor men for debt, one of the relics of barbarism that is not countenanced in any civilized country. He was in favor of the enactment of a law which would give the master the right to tie up and whip at his pleasure, his fellow citizen who happened to be so unfortunate as to be in service under the Peon law. He, we all know, was in favor of the law which passed last winter to enable him to plunder the railroad estate. These are some of the loving demonstrations he has made to the people through his legislative career.

Thus far we have had to say about the little Padre's love for the people whilst he was occupying public positions. Let us now see how he is a private life. That love which shows itself through charity for the suffering poor is the substantial kind for which

the people have the highest regard. Has the little Padre any of that kind which draws from his pockets and contributes to the relief of the destitute instead of exacting from the poor for the purpose of filling his purse? None at all. Here is the proof.

During this summer a large proportion of the people of Socorro County have depended upon the charity of the people of other parts of the Territory for the means of subsistence. Subscriptions have been taken up in the different counties and the contributions have been unusually liberal. It will be seen by the statements of receipts and expenditures which Capt. McFerran has made from time to time in these columns that upwards of five thousand dollars, in cash have been contributed and expended for the suffering in Socorro County. This sum was contributed by between four and five hundred citizens, some of whom were poor soldiers in the ranks whose monthly pay is thirteen dollars. But the name of Jose Manuel Gallegos is not to be found on any one of the subscription lists, nor has one dollar of his money been contributed for the relief of those poor and destitute people. They, too, are a part and parcel of the people whom the half organ says he loves so well.

In the above is briefly portrayed the character of the little Padre who is asking the people of New Mexico to elect him as their Delegate in Congress. More intemperate selfishness could not be concentrated in one man and there cannot be found in the limits of the Territory a man who has as little regard for the welfare of the people at large as has this same Padre. When he has a selfish end to serve, he accomplishes it without regard to the welfare, interests or rights of others. This is his character as written in his conduct as a Priest, as a member of the Legislature and as a private citizen. Who would vote for such a man?

Fourth of July.

This day was celebrated in Santa Fe in accordance with the programme previously circulated in the city. The procession composed of citizens and military, formed at the court house between the hours of nine and ten in the morning and marched around the square to the Plaza and around the Plaza to the Palace in front of the Secretary's office where there was fitted up a beautiful arcade of green and a stand ornamented with banners and other decorations for the accommodation of the officers of the day and the speakers and readers. Gov. Army acted as President, Hon. John S. Watts, Gen'l M. E. Pino, C. P. Clever, Esq., and others as vice Presidents. Judge Houghton, David J. Miller, Esq., and Don Santiago Baca were the Marshals of the day. The 5th Infantry Band was present and discoursed national and patriotic airs during the day.

The Declaration of Independence was read in Spanish by C. E. Wehe, Esq., who was followed by Nicolas Quintana, Esq., with the excellent address in Spanish which we to-day publish on the fourth page of the Gazette. The speech was well received and often encored. The declaration of Independence was then read by George E. Blake, Esq., in a clear and forcible manner. There was, after the reading of the Declaration in English, a speech made in the same language, but acting upon the adage that "De minimis non curat lex." we have nothing to say about it.

Now we are all right on the type question, and respectfully ask those who have job work of any description to be done, to give us a trial. We feel under many obligations to our friends for the confidence they have given us heretofore and hope to have an increase of favors, now that we can do more justice to our friends and ourselves.

Work will be performed on short notice, our force of workmen being ample and well skilled in the Art. THE JOURNALS.—Having finished and delivered the House Journals, in Spanish, to Secretary Army and it being the best work of the kind that has ever been executed in New Mexico, we think it but doing justice to say, that the printing was done by Mr. Thomas S. Tucker, the proof reading by Mr. David J. Miller, Translator of the Laws and Journals and the binding by Messrs. Ainsworth and Quigley of Capt. Helden's company U. S. 5th Infantry.

Col. Francisco Perea was in the city this week. Things are working most favorably for him in the Rio Abajo. The vote will be almost unanimous for him. He is now going on a visit to his friends in the northern counties. Our reports from Mora County are that Col. Perea will get a majority of the votes in that county. His friends in Taos, San Miguel and Rio Arriba are doing good work in his behalf and will succeed in bringing more than the usual strength to his ticket.

In Santa Fe County we are going to give him a routing majority.

NAVIGATOR IN ARIQUIC.—A letter from Sub-Agent, Henry Mercere, dated Ariquic, July 4th says: "The Navajos were in town last Wednesday night and drove off six head of cattle from the corral of Padre Salazar. Rather daring operation! It would be a daring operation for any other Indians than the Navajos, who seem to think the Territory, and all the things contained therein, belong to them. They, however, will be taught better than that by the town Col. Canon is doing with them this summer."
