FACTS TO BE REMEMBERED.

The picnic at Fort Jefferson, Ky., given by the Cairo Silver Cornet Band, will be held on Tuesday, the 31st day of May.

The school children will assemble at the Thirteenth street school house, at 8 o'clock, on Tuesday morning, and at half-past 8, the band will escort them to the foot of Tenth street, where the steamer Old Fellow, with large barges, will be moored to receive them.

All persons who purpose a participation in the festivities of the day, must be on board the boat or barges by half past 8 o'clock, at that hour, or immediately after receiving the school children on board, the boat will leave for the grounds.

The school children will be supplied tickets, through their teachers, on Monday, and these tickets will be taken up as the children pass on board the boat.

The school directors and teachers, the members of the band, and others, will exercise a careful watch over children unattended by their parents.

Intoxicating persons, or intoxicating liquors will not be allowed on the boat or barges.

BURGLAR ARRESTED.

Bob Williams, a colored man, finished his second term in the Penitentiary, about four weeks ago, and immediately returned to the field of his rascally exploits, Cairo. He is again in limbo, however, and has a lively prospect of doing the State further service as a penitentiary convict.

Last night he broke into the millinery store of Mrs. Lang, and abstracted therefrom six fine bonnets, fully trimmed, and three bolts of ribbon. Not satisfied with the acquisition of these goods, he broke into Mr. Blum's grocery store, on the corner Seventh and Washington, and carried off six clothes baskets, six brooms, two mops, one box of eggs and two door mats. All this booty he deposited in the house of a colored man living on Fifth street, named Isham Hill. Isham entertaining a suspicion that the goods had been stolen, conferred with Constable Arnold. Two hours later Arnold had Williams in charge. He found him carrying a trunk toward the freight depot and an examination of this trunk disclosed the presence of the bonnets.

Mr. Williams is now confined in the calaboose, and will undergo a preliminary examination on Monday next.

The following paragraph appeared in the BULLETIN, of Thursday:
