ORDINANCE. The following ordinance was presented and referred to the ordinance committee for report, to-wit:

An Ordinance in relation to wharfbait license, and the transaction of a mercantile business upon the same.

Sec. 1. That license may be granted to wharfbait to transact thereon a storage warehouse, reshipping and forwarding business.

Sec. 2. Every person, co-partnership of persons or body corporate, occupying or possessing any boat, vessel, float, dock, wharfbait or other structure situated on or anchored on the waters of either the Ohio or Mississippi rivers within the limits of said city, their agents or servants, who shall receive or forward or ship any goods, wares or merchandise on said boat, vessel, float, dock, wharfbait or other structure shall be deemed guilty of a violation of this ordinance.

Sec. 3. It shall not be lawful for any boat, vessel, float, dock, wharfbait or other structure to be stationed, moored or anchored on, at or near the shore of either the Ohio or Mississippi rivers within the limits of the city of Cairo for the purpose of loading any goods, wares or merchandise for shipment, or for the use of said city a sum not less than fifty dollars (\$50.00) more than one hundred dollars (\$100.00) for each and every day they are so engaged in carrying on the wharfbait business aforesaid without license.

Sec. 4. The provisions of the foregoing section shall not apply to steamboats, flatboats or other vessels used for navigating the Ohio and Mississippi rivers engaged in receiving and discharging freight.

Sec. 5. It shall not be lawful for any boat, vessel, float, dock, wharfbait or other structure to be stationed, moored or anchored on, at or near the shore of either the Ohio or Mississippi rivers within the limits of the city of Cairo for the purpose of loading any goods, wares or merchandise for shipment, or for the use of said city a sum not less than fifty dollars (\$50.00) more than one hundred dollars (\$100.00) for each and every day they are so engaged in carrying on the wharfbait business aforesaid without license.

RIVER NEWS. The wind of yesterday was hard on steamers as well as insecure buildings on shore. The Milbrey, bound from Memphis to Evansville, was compelled to lay at Columbus all day, and the Cape Girardeau packet, A. Baker, was blown across the Kentucky shore several miles below Cairo, and held there all day. The steam ferryboat went across to Missouri in the morning, but was unable to relinquish her hold on that shore until sundown. All the smaller craft were more or less detained.

The river continues rising steadily, but slowly. The total rise since Saturday is five inches.

The Mississippi is falling slowly at St. Louis, and only five feet six inches water is now reported to that city.

The Ohio is falling again at Pittsburg with six and a half feet water in the channel. It is rising from Catlettsburg to Cairo, with three feet large over the falls at Louisville, and five feet out to Cairo, but deepening rapidly.

The Cumberland and Tennessee are both rising, and there will be an abundance of water below Cairo in a few days.

The canal will be reopened at Louisville on Wednesday next, and boats can then pass through of much greater capacity than before the close. Still larger boats will be able to pass through if the original alterations intended are carried out next year. Unfortunately the "original alterations intended" will not allow Capt. Tinger's new boat to pass through. A very large lar over night.

Business here continues good at our levee.

The Warner and barges are loading here for New Orleans, and will receive from 1,000 to 1,500 tons.

All boats bound down stream, receive as much freight here as they want on the present water below.

The City of Chester, City of Vicksburg and Grand Tower have discharged over 2,000 bales eastern cotton, and 500 sacks dried fruit here for the T. O. R. N.

Other boats from below have discharged large quantities of sugar, molasses and assorted freight for shipment per rail and by steamer.

The Arlington, fully repaired, resumed her place in the Cairo and Columbus packet trade, and the Idlewild, resumed her place at Evansville.
