THE FIRE.

E. S. HARRELL'S IMMENSE FURNITURE WARE-HOUSE DESTROYED.

LOSS, BETWEEN TWENTY AND TWENTY-FIVE THOUSAND DOLLARS.

At ten minutes to seven o'clock yesterday evening, the alarm of fire was sounded from the Iberian Engine house, followed in an instant by all the other fire bells in the city.

People rushed into the streets looking in every direction for some token that would inform them of the whereabouts of the fire. They were not long in ignorance of its whereabouts, however, for by this time a glaring red light told that B. S. Harrell's immense furniture establishment was on fire.

The fire is supposed to have originated from a defective flue, as the flame first broke through the weatherboarding directly covering the flue in which the stove pipe entered. In half an hour from the time the fire alarm was sounded, the building was a mass of ruins.

The loss, including building and stock was variously estimated at from \$20,000 to \$25,000. Mr. Harrell had insurance, on building and stock, of only \$8,500. His loss will not fall short of \$12,000 at the least.
