##### BOATS TO LEAVE.

That fine ducal palace James Howard will leave for the sunny south this evening. The fleet Grand Tower is the regular mine boat for Memphis and all intermediate landings, leaving at 5 p.m. The Idlewild is the boat for Evansville. The Jim Fisk for Paducah, and the Illinois for Columbus, are daily departures.

##### CONDITION OF THE RIVERS.

The river is still on the retrograde movement and everything bids fair for low water in the Ohio river.

The Monongahela river has five feet in the channel and falling slowly. The decline in the Ohio at Cincinnati and Louisville continues. There is five and one-half feet in the canal.

Cumberland river is falling, with three feet on Harpeth Shoals.

Tennessee river is still on the decline, and is now down to a low stage.

Arkansas river has five feet in the channel and falling.

The Mississippi continues on the decline with a good stage to this port.

##### BUSINESS AND WEATHER.

Yesterday was another dull day in the river matters and the river presented a quiet appearance.

The weather was windy and the dust was buried in clouds, filling the eyes of passers-by. There were indications of rain last evening, which is needed through the country.

##### MISCELLANEOUS ITEMS.

John A. Wood, of the firm of Homer Wood & Co., Pittsburg, is now in the city attending to the coaling interest of the firm. He has a tow of coal lying in the bend, and will send the tow boat John A. Wood back to New Orleans with it.

Next to Wm. K. Brown they are the heaviest dealers in brown diamonds.

The Quickstep came in with hardly any freight. Freight at Evansville for the South is scarce, and what was there was shipped on the James Howard.

The Bee came out with 4 freighted barges and 1 ice barge. The Wild Cat and "Mary Ann" had tons of empty barges. Capt. Sedam of the Commonwealth left his boat here and went to St. Louis by rail. The Belle Memphis had little freight but a fair number of passengers.

The John Lumsden came in from Nashville with a light trip. She went up the Mississippi river a few miles after corn.

The Commonwealth and Glencoe each had good up-stream trips.

The coal dealers are getting their coal out of the Ohio river and bringing it to this port as fast as they can, on account of the continuing decline in the river, which will soon be below coal boat stage. There are several tows here now which will be sent south at an early day.

The mammoth James Howard will fill out her trip here. She did not find a great deal of freight at Evansville.

The R. E. Lee reships her freight and people for the Ohio river at Evansville and turn back from there.
