A severe wreck occurred near Gulf Junction, just below Dunnellon, on the Plant System, Sunday afternoon about six o'clock. A rail had been removed from the track on a curve. The engine and every car left the track. The engineer, Mr. James Roach, well known in this city, was instantly killed. All the other trainmen and every passenger miraculously escaped.

It was clearly evident that the train had been purposely wrecked. The crobar used for removing the rail was left on the side of the track.

The bloodhounds of Mr. Buttgenbach were employed and the proper man run down. He confessed his crime and said he deserved death. He was a negro. His name was Roman McKinney and said he was from Georgia. His purpose was robbery. He expected a great many of the passengers to have been killed and in the darkness and excitement he planned to rifle their pockets.

The man was lynched near the scene of the wreck.

**Florida's Phosphate Industry.**

Hon. H. S. Elliott, state statistician at Tallahassee, has received reports from the United States custom house authorities at the several Florida ports which furnish evidence that the phosphate mining industries in this state are increasing greatly in magnitude. For several years Florida has surpassed all other states in the output of phosphates, and the extent of the deposits of this rock is not known even yet, although prospecting has been carried on constantly for the past ten years.

The official figures received by Mr. Elliott cover the eleven months from January 1, 1900, to December 1, 1900, and show that Florida hard rock and pebble phosphates have been exported from the several ports during that period as follows: Tampa, 205,092 tons; Key West, 38,008 tons; Fernandina, 164,020 tons; Pensacola, 132,507 tons.

The state statistician also has reliable information showing that about 50,000 tons were exported from Punta Gorda, on the Gulf coast, and something over 100,000 tons were carried by rail to Savannah and Brunswick, Ga., and shipped from those ports. The exports of Florida phosphates for the entire year of 1900 is estimated at about 800,000 tons.
