THE GOSPEL OF WEALTH

In an article printed in the Ocala Banner some time since we said we tipped our hat to certain queenly types of American womanhood, mentioning especially Mrs. Leland Standford, who is administering her will and distributing her wealth before she dies.

We tip our hat also to certain kingly types of American manhood.

Of these types Mr. Andrew Carnegie stands far out to the front as a conspicuous example.

When has the world ever before seen such a benefactor?

Possessing greater riches than any man now living, or who has ever lived, Mr. Carnegie does not attempt to explain away Christ's saying of the difficulty of the "rich man entering into the kingdom of heaven," but affirms its justice and proclaims that "it is a disgrace to die rich!"

Listen!

It is the duty, he says, of the rich man to "sell all he has and give to the poor."

For fear of offending the rich the pulpits have long since abandoned the text that Mr. Carnegie now makes prominent.

His literal construction of that text, his affirmation of its justice and his example of its application to himself may stop the wild scramble for riches and cause people who are rich to distribute the same in a manner that will do the most good to the world before they cross over the dark river.

Mr. Carnegie is establishing libraries in all parts of the United States, costing all the way from twenty-five thousand dollars to one and two millions of dollars.

He has given five millions for a home for those who grow old in the employment of the Carnegie Steel Works, or become disabled in its employment.

He contemplates giving twenty-five millions for the establishment of a school of technology at Pittsburg, Pa.

There are three ways, Mr. Carnegie says, that a man may dispose of his wealth. First, to found a family; second, to bequeath to the public after his death; third, to give to the public before he dies.

When men have provided "for their wives and daughters moderate sources of income and very moderate allowances," they may, he declares, "hesitate in bequeathing them more, for it is no longer questionable that great sums bequeathed often work more for the injury than for the good of the recipients."

The growing disposition in all highly civilized countries to tax more and more heavily large estates left at death is, he thinks, "a cheering indication of the growth of a salutary change in public opinion. * * * Of all forms of taxation this seems the wisest. Men who continue hoarding great sums all their lives, the proper use of which for public ends would work good to the community from which it chiefly came, should be made to feel that the community, in the form of the state, cannot thus be deprived of its proper share. By taxing estates heavily at death the state marks its condemnation of the selfish millionaire's unworthy life." He would have the inheritance tax rapidly progressive, beginning at nothing upon small holdings needed for the comfort and education of the children, and "increasing rapidly as the amounts swell, until of the millionaire's hoard, as of Shylock's, at least

comes to the privy coffer of the state."

Mr. Carnegie is teaching a doctrine and setting an example that will have a most wholesome influence, and the example will be more salutary than the large sums of money he is so wisely and judiciously distributing.

On Wednesday morning they met in the Gary block, second floor, where their work might proceed with less interruption, and which is also more convenient.


