OUR GREAT SCHOOL INTERESTS.

Proceedings of the Board of Public Instruction for Marion County.

[OFFICIAL.]

OCALA, FLA., April 8, 1901.

The board of public instruction in and for Marion county met April 8th in regular session with the following members present: G. S. Scott, chairman, B. R. Blitch and B. I. Hull.

Minutes of last meeting were read and approved.

The election returns for creating a special tax school district, held at Pine Level the 30th day of March, were canvassed. Said returns showed five votes in favor of creating special district and two against creating district. One vote, being illegal, was thrown out by managers of election. On motion it was declared that the territory as advertised in a petition and voted for at said election according to law, is hereby created a special tax school district. It was further declared that R. D. Stokes, F. B. Turner and J. W. Morrison, having received the highest number of votes for trustees, are elected to serve as trustees for the said special tax school district for the next two ensuing years, and it was further declared that a majority of the votes cast was for a three mill levy on all real and personal property in the territory of said district.

A petition was brought before the board, signed by one-fourth of the qualified voters who pay a tax on real or personal property, asking the board to call an election for enlarging the Ocala special tax school district. After asserting that said petition had been published according to law for four consecutive weeks, it was ordered that an election be called, to be held on the 14th day of May, A. D., 1901, for the purpose of enlarging the Ocala special tax school district, and to elect three trustees and to fix the millage of said proposed district.

The superintendent reported that the schools of Maysville, Weirsdale and Citra were now having petitions advertised to bring before the board the first Monday in May, asking the board to call elections to create special tax school districts at above named places.

The treasurer's report was examined, found correct and approved as follows:

Reports and accounts amounting to \$2261.67 were examined, found correct and ordered paid by warrants on the county treasurer.

Also reports and accounts of Ocala special tax school district amounting to \$999.00 were ordered paid by warrants on the treasury.

There being no further business the board adjourned to meet the first Monday in March.

Finding Days of the Week.

The prematurely aged young man whose duty it is to get up The Record's "Answers to Correspondents" column says that queries of the same nature always come in bunches. They seem to be epidemic. Just at present a great many people seem eager to know what day of the week they were born on, and it keeps him busy figuring the dates out. He has a system which he uses, and for the benefit of others who may be in search of like information it is herewith given:

For instance, take Jan. 15, 1868. A man born on that date writes to know what day of the week it fell on. In order to ascertain this divide the figures representing the year by 4, rejecting the remainder, if any. To this dividend and quotient add the number of days in the year to the given date, inclusive, always reckoning 28 days in February. Divide the sum by 7, and the remainder will be the number of the day of the week, 0 signifying Saturday. Here is the illustration, taking Jan. 15, 1868:

Thus, by this calculation, which is infallible, it will be seen that Jan. 15, 1868, fell on the fifth day of the week, which is Thursday.—Philadelphia Record.


