In order to be accurate, many of the examinations in the high school and grammar school will necessarily be written, but the visitor can readily see the scope of the work and the thoroughness required by an examination of the questions submitted for this examination and the reports of previous examinations.

The program of the public entertainment of the primary and intermediate departments will be rendered on Monday night, May 20th, at the Marion opera house.

The program of the high school and grammar school department will be rendered on Tuesday night, May 21st, at the opera house.

A small admission will be charged at each of these entertainments to defray the expenses and pay the rent for the organs used in the school during the year.

General Houston was a brother of Mrs. Anna B. Hopkins, of Orange Lake, this county.

Flogging Convicts.

To the Editor of the Banner.

From a purely commercial view, it may be that leasing the convicts is the most practical way for the state to deal with them.

If all the reports of cruelty on them are untrue, and if the reports of the state superintendent that they are comfortably housed, fed, clothed and reasonably worked are true, no doubt that if the state worked them they would be no better off.

Of course it cannot be expected that people convicted of crime and sentenced to imprisonment and labor shall have a very easy time while serving their term. Only a few comforts at most can they expect.

But this is not all that is involved in the lease system.

For it is under many obligations of duty to all persons whom it deprives of liberty, and it has no moral right to transfer these duties and obligations to others for a price.

The state has no right to turn a prisoner into a slave.

Flogging is not allowed for by any law of Florida. Why does the board permit it? It is beastly, brutal and an institution of barbarism.

The creature who has to suffer a flogging in a convict camp, ought, before he is whipped, warn the brute who has volunteered to commit the crime to desist at the cost of his life, and if the warning is unheeded, then if the victim survives the brutality, he ought not to rest until he hunts down his scourger, and in any manner most convenient and effective, slay him as though he were a dog.

Notice of the June Examination.

The regular state uniform examination for teachers will commence on Tuesday, June 4th, 1901, at 9 o'clock a. m., in the Ocala High School building for white applicants and in Howard Academy building for colored applicants. All teachers who expect to teach in Marion county and do not hold an unexpired certificate should take this examination. Teachers will be required to supply themselves with foolscap or legal cap paper, pen and ink. One dollar will be charged each applicant, according to law, to pay the expenses of the examination. Three days will be given those applying for second and third grades, and four days for first grades.
