Regaining Lost Ground.

Mr. James Sims, one of the old land marks of Orange Springs, was a pleasant visitor to Ocala this week. He reports that the orange trees in his section are growing very vigorously and promise a very hopeful yield of fruit the coming season. Mr. Sims has twenty-seven acres which he has cultivated very diligently since the disastrous freeze, and he feels that his labors will be rewarded many fold. He says that some of his trees have borne fruit every year since that disaster and this year his entire twenty-seven acres is white with bloom. Mr. Sims says that the old orange growers are as buoyant as they were in 1870 when the first trees were planted for profit.

Mr. Henry Dunn, of Citra, was in town also and gives the same encouraging reports of the growers in his vicinity. It will not be long before Citra will again be an important orange shipping point. The hope that "springs eternal in the human breast" is now finding beautiful expression in the countenances of the Citra orange growers.

Mr. J. J. Terig is just back from the southern portion of Marion and Lake counties and the condition of the growers in that section has made him most enthusiastic for the future of this industry. He says the appearance of the orange groves around Candler and Lake Weir carries one back to the halcyon days before the great freeze. He saw some groves in Lake county that will easily bear five hundred boxes to the acre.

There is no question but that Lake and Marion counties will again become the great orange producing counties of the state.

In view of the fact that a great deal has been said recently as to the medicinal properties of the waters of Pierian Spring, (Salt Spring), located on Jos. M. Hernandez grant, the following health analysis of that water, kindly made by Prof. H. K. Miller, chemist at the Florida Agricultural College, will be of interest.

Laboratory No. 1291—
Total solids, 6973 parts per million.
Chlorine, 2840 parts per million.
Hardness, (Calcium Carbonate,) 1497 parts per million.
Free ammonia, none.
Albuminoid ammonia, .065 parts per million.
Nitrites, none.
Nitrates, none.

In addition to the constituents tabulated the water contains a large amount of magnesium sulphate and an appreciable amount of hydrogen sulphide. The appearance, clear; odor, that of sulphur water; suspended matter, white flocculent particles; residue on ignition, darkened; reaction of the residue, alkaline.

There are two objectionable features to this water for drinking purposes. The albuminoid ammonia is much higher than is regarded safe. The total solids are too great for a water which is to be used constantly. It is quite possible that the water, used sparingly, may be beneficial in certain diseases and digestive disorders. Before drinking, however, I should desire to know that its use had not been followed by ill results on account of the fact that it is contaminated with organic matter.

NOTE—I only made what is known as a health analysis. The albuminoid ammonia in the water is probably derived from decaying vegetable matter. The chlorine in the water is most probably combined with sodium, though some of it may be combined with calcium and some with magnesium.
