

OUR COUNTY LEGISLATORS.

Proceedings of the Board of County Commissioners—Regular Session.

A regular meeting of the board of county commissioners was held Monday, June 3, 1901. Present: J. L. Edwards, H. W. Long, N. A. Fort and E. L. Wartmann.

The board was called to order. Commissioner Wartmann nominated H. W. Long for chairman of the board, and he was unanimously elected.

The minutes of last meeting were read and approved.

It was ordered that in the future not more than 25 cents will be paid for cutting logs out of public roads.

The commissioners appointed to lay out road from city limits of Ocala at terminus of Sanchez street to Anthony, Sparr and Citra, submitted their report.

OUR GREAT SCHOOL INTERESTS.

Proceedings of the Board of Public Instruction for Marion County.

OCALA, FLA., June 3, 1901.

The board of public instruction in and for Marion county met June 3rd in regular session with the following members present: G. S. Scott, chairman, B. R. Blitch and B. I. Hull.

Minutes of last meeting were read and approved.

A number of the patrons of the Brussell and Marshville schools appeared before the board. The Brussell patrons asking that the Brussell school be allowed to continue at Daisy and the Marshville patrons opposing it. The matter was deferred until June 17.

Several applications for repairs and the establishment of new schools were before the board, all of which were deferred until the special meeting June 17 and 18.

The election returns for the election for changing the Ocala special tax school district were canvassed with the following result: Total number of votes cast, 45; for changing special tax district, 40; against changing special tax district, 3.

For Trustees—J. M. Barco, 43; C. L. Bittinger, 41; W. S. Bullock, 41.

For Levy—For one mill, 8; for two mills, 5; for three mills, 24.

On motion it was decided that the Ocala special tax school district No. 1 is hereby changed according to law and to correspond with boundaries as advertised in a call for the election to change said special tax school district. It is further declared that J. M. Barco, C. L. Bittinger and W. S. Bullock, receiving a majority of all votes cast, are hereby elected trustees of said district for the next two ensuing years, and it is further declared that a majority of the votes cast, being for a three mill levy, that three be levied and collected on all real and personal property in said special district for the next two ensuing years.

The bond of Frank B. Turner, Durant Stokes and J. T. Rose as trustees of Pine Level special tax school district in the sum of \$200, with J. F. Hall and G. O. Turner as sureties, was examined and approved.

The superintendent was instructed to send the trustees of all the special tax school districts a statement of amounts they are due the county board and request them to make payments if possible by June 17, that outstanding warrants of county may be reduced as much as possible before the superintendent's annual report to the state is made.

The Ocala trustees filed itemized estimate of their expenses for the term of 1901 and 1902; also recommended teachers for both the Ocala High School and Howard Academy, except two positions in the former.

The confirmation of teachers was deferred until the first Monday in July and action on the estimated expenses deferred until June 17.

Reports and accounts amounting to \$414.00 were examined, found correct and ordered paid by warrants on the county treasurer.

Also reports for the Ocala special tax school district amounting to \$694.50 were ordered paid by warrants on treasurer of special district.

There being no further business the board adjourned to meet in special session June 17, 1901.

A Severe Tornado.

A very large section of country north of Ocala extending from Kendrick to Anthony and on northward was visited by an old fashioned tornado last Saturday which caused a great deal of destruction. Fences were not only blown down but were blown away. Some were carried on the bosom of the winds for a distance of several hundred yards. Trees were uprooted and growing crops suffered severely.

Mr. E. C. McLeod had a new board fence around his farm and nearly the whole of it was swept away. His un-gathered oats are now past gathering and his corn was leveled to the ground and was badly damaged. He estimates his loss at \$500.

Hon. A. P. Baskin, at Anthony, seems to be the worst loser. He had a large field planted in cantaloupes over which there seems to have been a cloud-burst and both fruit and vine seem to have been washed literally away. The rainfall measured fourteen inches.

Besides losing his cantaloupes Mr. Baskin lost a splendid corn crop and acres of fencing.

Every farmer in the path of the tornado suffered more or less injury and all day preachers and laymen—good people all—were busy repairing fences.
