

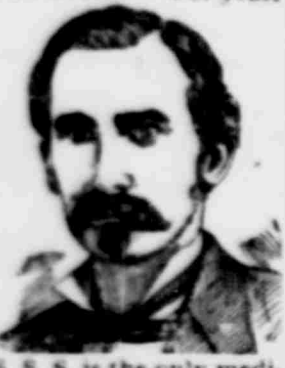

## OUR COUNTY LEGISLATORS.

Proceedings of the Board of County Commissioners—Regular Session.

At a regular meeting of the board of county commissioners held Monday, August 5, 1901, the following members were present: H. W. Long, chairman, and Commissioners J. L. Edwards, F. S. Latus, N. A. Fort and E. L. Wartmann.

The minutes of last meeting were read and approved.

Attention of the board was called to the destitute condition of three orphan children of Mr. Davenport who died on the 3rd inst., and the matter was referred to Commissioners Wartmann and Edwards for investigation.

The following bonds were approved: W. F. Pulliam, constable, district No. 2; J. J. Turner, justice of the peace, district No. 5; C. M. Proctor, inspector of marks and brands, district No. 7; John L. Hurst, ferryman at Stokes' Ferry; J. C. Mathews, L. K. Edwards, Albert Fort, James W. Reynolds and Sam Davis, to carry pistol; J. A. Hicks and John T. Lewis, to carry rifle; George Stewart, notary public.

It was ordered that W. W. Cassels be allowed \$5 per month from July 1, 1901.

Commissioners Wartmann and Edwards were appointed a committee to confer with A. B. Rou with reference to securing right of way through his land for the Flemington road.

Commissioners appointed to lay out Ocala and Anthony road as ordered changed from Griner farm to Anthony submitted their report, which was accepted.

H. A. Ford and D. S. Williams, of the Ocala board of trade, appeared before the board and urged an appropriation for getting out a pamphlet for distribution at the Pan-American exposition.

Chairman Long submitted the correspondence between himself and the governor and state health officer, with reference to epidemics and infectious diseases, and his action in the matter were sustained.

It was ordered that hereafter in cases where prisoners have worked out sentences the clerk credit the sheriff with amount charged against him in such cases.

Lands of A. C. Johnson and estate of Wm. Cox, each raised at last meeting from \$500 to \$1000, were put back to \$500 in each case.

Communication from W. J. Edwards, chairman, street committee of Ocala city council, asking the county to take charge of the fountains on the court house square, was read and ordered laid on the table for the present.

Applications for permits to sell

liquors, wine and beer in election district No. 1 were filed by J. F. Edwards, Carmichael & Son Co., C. P. McGrath & Co., and John P. Galloway; and in district No. 24 by W. H. Stephens, Maurice Strauss and Hollandsworth & Griggs. Orders that notices of such applications be published as required by law—such applications to be considered at next meeting.

Claim of Gordon & Davis for \$350 for pair of mules drowned in crossing the Ocklawaha river at Sharpe's ferry, referred to county attorney.

A communication from the Sumter county commissioners asking a bid for hire of that county's convicts was read and the clerk was directed to notify said board that this board does not wish to hire any convicts.

W. E. Allen tendered his resignation as commissioner to collect exhibit for state fair, which was accepted.

The board adjourned until Tuesday.

### TUESDAY.

Board met. All members present. It was ordered that each commissioner's district be constituted a cattle district, and the following inspectors were appointed to inspect the marks and brands of cattle shipped or driven out of the county from such districts: No. 1, John Pasteur; No. 2, A. J. Turner; No. 3, J. B. Branch; No. 4, J. W. Reynolds; No. 5, Chas. Turner.

Rules and regulations for the preservation and accounting for of tools and other county property in the hands of road overseers were adopted. [See official record in clerk's office.]

Whereas, The ferry at Stokes' ferry is across a river which forms a dividing line between Marion and Citrus counties, and the county of Marion has for a number of years kept and maintained a free ferry at said point, the county of Citrus refusing to pay any part of the costs; therefore be it Resolved, That the ferryman at Stokes' ferry be directed to charge all persons not citizens of Marion county crossing at said ferry the regular toll or ferriage established for said ferry, and to report to the board on the first of each month the amount of such collections.

Upon recommendation of the committee it was ordered that Fred, James and Leo Davenport, orphan children, be admitted to the poor farm.

It was ordered that Amanda McGee be allowed \$2 per month for care of John Wordlaw, subject to fits.

Claim of Gordon & Davis was laid over until next meeting.

It was ordered that J. L. Hinton, ferryman at Sharpe's ferry, be cited to appear before the board at its next meeting to show cause why proceedings should not be instituted against him for neglect of duty.

Petition to macadamize the Silver Springs and Eureka road from Silver Springs to what is known as the edge of the flatwoods, was granted.

Petition to change the Silver Springs and Grahamville road to run as follows: Commence where hard road turns south at Silver Springs and run north one block, thence west to cross Forbes' branch at present crossing, thence along present road to point one-fourth mile beyond seven-mile post, thence west to intersect present road one-fourth mile from crossing at Grahamville, was laid over until next meeting.

Applications of Mrs. Martha C. Long and L. P. Stevens for pension from state were approved.

Sheriff P. H. Nugent submitted the following proposition, which was accepted:

Board of County Commissioners, Marion Co.: "GENTLEMEN:—The following proposition as to feed of prisoners is respectfully submitted to you:

"I offer to feed all county convicts in jail or at camp on road for 25 cents per day per prisoner, the county furnishing cook at any camp, and said cook not to be put in feed bill at all.

"All other prisoners to be fed at rate provided by law. Respectfully,

"P. H. NUGENT, Sheriff.

"August 6, 1901.

"All camp equipment to be furnished by county.

"P. H. NUGENT, Sheriff."

E. P. Thagard, tax collector, submitted list of doubles, errors, etc., on real estate on tax rolls of 1900, which was examined and approved.

The matter of making an appropriation for the state fair at Jacksonville was deferred until next meeting, and the citizens and tax payers requested to give an expression as to their wishes in the premises by petition or otherwise as to the wisdom of making an appropriation.

P. H. Nugent, sheriff, proposed that he would purchase two first-class double teams for use on public roads, the board to have the option on January 1, 1902, of purchasing same at cost or paying for use thereof the sum of \$2.50 for each ten hours' work of each team and driver. In case of purchase the county to pay the costs of feeding and repairs, which was accepted.

The superintendent of the poor farm was authorized to build a new barn. His house was also ordered painted.

Tax collector reported collection of \$16.90 on account of licenses, and \$106.00 on account of poll taxes.

T. E. Pasteur, county treasurer, submitted his report showing receipts
