A NEW STATE FAIR PRESIDENT.

Geo. W. Wilson Resigns and S. H. Gaitskill is his Successor.

Jacksonville Metropolis. A Metropolis reporter, learning that there had been some important changes in the executive department of the state fair association, called on Mr. Geo. W. Wilson, the principal promoter of the fair, and its president since last March.

In reply to the inquiry as to the changes, Mr. Wilson said:

"Yes. There have been several changes. In March, when the association was organized, I was elected president against my protest, and against my repeated appeals to be relieved of this work, because this, combined with my many other duties, would be more than one man could possibly stand physically or mentally, but the gentlemen composing the organization insisted I should serve, at least until all the many departments that go to make a state fair could be thoroughly systematized and organized, and that from the nature of my past experience in such matters, the pressure was more than I could, in justice to the fair, resist. For four months I was comparatively alone in the preliminary work, until Maj. Healy came to headquarters as general manager to relieve me of details. For several months we have worked together, until now the organization is on a sound footing, and all the many links are well welded, and I feel that I should be relieved of the exacting work incident to the last days prior to opening the fair, and feeling this way, I called the executive committee together for the purpose of asking it to take from my shoulders the responsibility of president, which they kindly did by electing Mr. S. H. Gaitskill, of Marion county, president."

WHO MR. GAITSKILL IS.

"Mr. Gaitskill is a stranger in public life in Florida, and what do you know of him, Mr. Wilson?" inquired the reporter.

"Mr. Gaitskill," was the reply, "was my neighbor for many years when I lived in Marion county, and I know him to be a man of sterling qualities, worthy of every confidence. He is a man of unusually strong executive ability that will develop into strength as he gains experience. He is a fellow Kentuckian, and we have enjoyed the warmest friendship during the years that he has been in Florida. He is a farmer of long experience and just suited to preside over an agricultural fair."

Wellington Expelled From Union League.

A telegram from Baltimore states that a meeting of the board of governor of the Union League of Maryland, resolutions were adopted expelling Senator George L. Wellington from membership in the organization. The resolutions, after referring to the attempted assassination of President McKinley by Czolgosz, state that "the people of Maryland have learned with shame and loathing that George L. Wellington, a representative of this state in the senate of the United States, has counteracted the act of this traitor to his country and enemy of mankind by repeated and public expressions of indifference to the act or its results."

The resolution ordered that the senator be expelled in consequence of these statements.

Prices Adopted by Turpentine Men.

At the recent convention in Jacksonville the following scale of prices was adopted: Chipping, \$23 for 10,500 boxes, and no rations; raking trees, 20 to 25 cents; horse, wagon and driver, \$16 to \$20; dipping, 33 1/3 cents per barrel; cutting boxes, 11 1/4 cents. Renting out boxes to laborers was prohibited.
