Death of A. H. R. Frederick.

Last Sunday afternoon at his home in this city, Dr. A. H. R. Frederick died very suddenly of heart failure.

The deceased was sixty-six years of age, and was born at Cusseta, Ala., in 1835.

Dr. Frederick was graduated in medicine before the outbreak of the war, and during that struggle he was assistant surgeon in the 47th Alabama regiment, Hilliard's legion.

He came to Ocala in 1890 and during his stay here vigorously prosecuted the practice of his profession. He was ruling elder in the Presbyterian church, and a member of the Knights of Honor.

His remains were shipped last Monday to his old home at Lafayette, Ala., where they were interred.

Dr. Frederick leaves a wife, two sons, three daughters, three brothers, a number of sisters, a nephew, Hon. C. M. Brown, of this city, and a large circle of friends to mourn his sudden death. The Banner extends its sympathy to the sorrowing relatives.

Mrs. Solomon Thrilling died suddenly Thursday morning of heart failure. She was fifty-eight years old and had been living in Ocala for thirty-five years. She leaves a husband and four children who were devoted to her.

A Southern Monument to McKinley.

The Atlanta Journal has started the effort for the erection of a monument to the late President McKinley by the people of the South.

It is a patriotic movement that we believe will bear good fruit.

It was at Atlanta that President McKinley gave expression to the patriotic sentiment that the time had arrived for the "nation to care for the Confederate dead."

The movement started by the Atlanta Journal is warmly seconded by the press and pulpit of the whole South.

Rev. C. B. Wilmer, rector of St. Luke's church at Atlanta, has contributed \$25 and an eloquent plea for the erection of the monument.

He says it would be a "profoundly religious and patriotic act."

"There can be no question," says this distinguished preacher, "that through his death at the hands of an assassin the virtues of William McKinley are brought home to the American people and the world as could never otherwise have been the case."

We remark by way of parenthesis that the Ocala Banner gave expression to a similar utterance and was foolishly called to task therefor by a neighboring sheet.

Mr. Wilmer goes on further to say: "Even an unbeliever in the Christian religion must admit the historic fact that the Christ spirit lives more powerfully in human hearts today by virtue of His martyrdom—because he let shine the light of love and truth against the dark background of malignant hate."

Further along he says: "But there was another question, and with the settlement of that also is associated the name of William McKinley: Should the country be really one in heart and soul? Should patriotism and love ratify the arbitrament of the sword?"

"By this attitude toward old Confederate officers, by his noble words spoken in this city, by his being president of the whole country, and crowning all by death, William McKinley has melted all hearts into one."

The noted divine caps his eloquent plea as follows:

"Let us not only take home these lessons to our hearts, but let us also perpetuate the memory of them to be to all coming generations a fountain of inspiration. For the nation to do this would be fitting, but no monument erected by the whole nation, however costly or splendid, could wear so glorious an aureole, could so bear witness to a brave people's appreciation of broad-mindedness and magnanimity. It would give a baptism of fraternity to the whole country and challenge the attention of the world. William McKinley extended to us a hand of fellowship: we will give him ours."

There were a great many remarkable editorials written on the death of President McKinley. Perhaps the most remarkable was the one that appeared in the Dunnellon Citizen.

We quote one or two sentences:

"In commenting upon the tragic death—death by martyrdom of President Wm. McKinley—will say that we have been reading about and after him ever since his first aspirancy for the presidency of these United States. He was undoubtedly one of the most efficient presidents we have ever had. He was always on the alert looking forward for the welfare of the American people, and saw to it that they had every protection from all the assaults that may come from without his jurisdiction."

"If we preferred utilizing the imported products instead of the home, there were ways and means for us to get them, and pay the duty because there was demand for labor and wages was good, which is far better than free trade and the consumer of the same without employment at any price."

"Take him as a peace-maker, and we can truthfully say in his behalf 'Blessed are the peace-maker' notwithstanding we had war under his administration. 'It must needs be offenses come; but woe to that man by whom the offense cometh.' This latter was the man that blew up the 'Maine' in Havana harbor."

"At the close of the last presidential campaign, many a southern man went to the polls voted democratic and praying republican on account of our government being less tyrannical than it had been for years."

"President McKinley, deceased, will never be forgotten by no civilized nation, whether they were exact followers of him or not. He had a thousand commendable traits of character to one of the reverse. The longer we lived under his administration the better we liked him, and we can only hope that his successor will keep on the lines of his predecessor, and he will soon win the confidence of the south as well as the north."


