### Passed Over the Mayor's Veto.

For some time past a bill has been before the Ocala city council for granting to the Ocala Street and Suburban Railway Company the right to run its trains over North Third Street. The same met with very vigorous protests from the property holders living along said street, and a largely signed petition was presented to the mayor urging him to veto the measure, which he did.

Another bill was afterwards introduced claiming to have overcome the objections set forth in Mayor Fishel's veto. The property owners again urged the mayor to veto it, claiming that the street is an exceedingly narrow one and the operating of trains on it would materially damage the property on each side of it. The mayor again vetoed the measure, but it was passed over his veto last Tuesday night by the requisite two-thirds vote.

Mr. H. L. Anderson, for whose benefit the franchise was granted, claims that the same will result to the material welfare of the city of Ocala; that his object is to connect the S. S. & W. with the G. & G. which now runs as near Ocala as Fairfield, a distance of twelve miles, and which has connections direct to Atlanta.

### To State Fair Exhibitors.

All exhibits should be placed in the depot they are to be shipped from, securely packed in boxes, packages or otherwise, with a shipping tag I have mailed to every locality of the county affixed to each package, on Thursday, the 14th inst., so as to insure the shipping of such exhibits the first train on Friday, the 15th. Exhibitors will also get the depot or express agent through whom they ship to make duplicate bills of lading and forward one to H. W. Long, care of G. P. Healy, General Manager State Fair, Jacksonville, so as to enable me to keep in touch with all exhibits sent, and enter them in a book that will be kept for that purpose. Observance of the foregoing instructions will simplify matters and aid me very materially in transferring exhibits and getting them in proper position in Marion county's space.

### Result of Tuesday's Elections.

Seth Low, former president of Columbia University, and four years ago the citizen union's candidate for the mayor of Greater New York, was on Tuesday elected mayor of Greater New York, defeating Edward Shephard, of Brooklyn, the democratic nominee by a plurality of between 30,000 and 40,000.

The election in Ohio resulted in large republican majorities; in Pennsylvania the democratic ticket gained although easily defeated; in Maryland and Kentucky both branches of the legislature will be democratic; in Virginia, sweeping democratic majority; Mississippi elected democratic secretary and treasurer of state; the republican ticket won in Colorado, Nebraska, Massachusetts, Rhode Island and New Jersey.
