ROLLINS VICTORIOUS.

Wins the Base Ball Game From the Agricultural College Team.

What was advertised to be a bright and interesting game of base ball between the teams of the Florida Agricultural College and Rollins College proved to be a very one-sided affair. Aside from the individual work of one or two of the players, and a couple of slight accidents, the game was devoid of sensation. It is perhaps too early in the season for the boys to be at their best, the Lake City boys having had scarcely any practice, and Rollins had played only three games.

The game was called at half past two, with Rollins at the bat. Neither side scored in the first inning. In the second Rollins made two hits, and taking advantage of Lake City's errors, made three runs. Evernden smashed a terrific liner over the left field fence and tallied another run for Rollins in the third inning. He made a tour of the bases before the ball could be returned to the diamond. Rollins added four more runs to their score in the fourth.

Up to this time Lake City had failed to score a single run. For the next three innings neither side was allowed to score, but in the eighth Rollins made two, then three more in the ninth. Still Lake City was not able to make anything but goose eggs, nine of them having been placed to her credit.

The work of the Rollins battery was excellent, the pitcher, Walker, having struck out sixteen men. In fact, the whole Rollins team played excellent ball, and had the other team been in as good condition the base ball public would have been treated to an excellent exhibition. Lake City has some very fine material for a good team, but they were at a disadvantage in not having had sufficient practice.

During the practice before the game, Booth, of Rollins, was hit in the eye by a batted ball, and will wear that member closed for several days. In the sixth inning, Evernden, when running to second base, came in collision with Hensley and both were hurt so badly that the game was stopped for several minutes. All of these young men showed their pluck and determination by remaining in the game, though they were badly hurt, especially Mr. Evernden, whose nose was broken.

The members of both teams are gentlemanly young men, and it has been a great pleasure to have them with us. They played a clean, quiet game, and we hope they will select Ocala again as a half-way ground on which to play their games.

Considering the condition of the weather, and the other attractions in town, the game was well attended.

Committee on monuments: G. L. Baltzell, Gen. Robert Bullock, T. D. Lancaster, also Mrs. J. K. Munterlyn of Jacksonville, and Mrs. A. B. Hopkins, of Orange Lake.

The veterans then tendered a vote of thanks to the Daughters of the Confederacy for the reception given them at the Montezuma Hotel Friday night.

Jacksonville was chosen as the place for holding the next reunion of the Second Brigade.

After this they adjourned. The Veterans expressed themselves as having had a very pleasant visit in our city, and some time in the future we hope to have them with us again.
