Rules.

1. All individual, collective or county exhibits competing for prizes in this department, must be of Florida production.
2. No article shall compete for two premiums except when it may enter into a collective exhibit of a county competing for a county prize.
3. The scale of points shall be determined by the judges selected.
4. All exhibits must be in place not later than Tuesday morning, Nov. 11, or they will not be permitted to enter as competing for prizes.
5. Packages by express or freight must be prepaid in every instance where a shipping blank, issued by the fair officers, is not presented to the station agent.
