ELECTION CALLED

Commissioners Meet and November 28 is Set for Wet and Dry Decision.

The board of county commissioners spent the day Wednesday in going over the petition presented asking for a special election to determine whether or not liquors shall be sold in Marion county.

After examining the list and erasing all names therefrom as requested by the signers the board decided that a sufficient number remained thereon to call said election.

At the meeting Wednesday night a resolution was passed calling for said election to be held on Nov. 28.

A special meeting of the board was called for Oct. 18 to revise the registration list and attend to other business necessary to the holding of the special election.

The board then adjourned until 8 o'clock Thursday morning.

Attorneys L. N. Green and W. K. Zewadski were present at Wednesday night's session in the interest of the election petition. County Attorney Hocker was also present as advisor for the board.

Dress Parade Wednesday Afternoon—Company Left for Orlando Yesterday Morning.

Ocala's streets presented a very military appearance Wednesday.

The tents had to be taken down and packed up, as well as all the other paraphernalia necessary for a military company while in camp.

In the afternoon about 4:30 o'clock Captain Nash, commanding the Rifles, had a dress parade and battalion drill. This was a very pleasant break in the summer afternoon's monotony, and was witnessed by quite a large number of our citizens, among the crowd being many ladies and children. The drill and manouvers were cleverly executed and the company made a most excellent showing.

The company, the roster of which appeared in our paper Wednesday morning, left on a special train at 7 o'clock yesterday morning over the Coast Line for Orlando. They will be absent for ten days and are anticipating the biggest kind of a time imaginable.
