"BLOWING IT ALL IN."

The Cruel Cost of Drink—\$1,000,000 a Day Spent in Gurgling Booze.

Mayor Joseph W. Murphy, of Wash. Ind., who believes in a humane treatment for drunkards and has plans for his reformation, has gathered statistics concerning the enormous cost to men and their families, as well as to the community and country, of the abnormal appetites of the thirsty clan. In New York it is estimated that \$1,000,000 a day is sent gurgling down the throats of nip-takers and the most extensive drinkers. What the saloon habit means to the individual who takes five drinks a day and smokes five cigars—to the man, we will say, who spends \$1 a day on himself in this way—is clearly and convincingly set out in the following table, which shows how a man could spend the booze and make money to better advantage to himself and family if he chose to do so.

Here is what he could buy for what he "blows in":

FOR SELF—

- 2 suits of clothes \$19.00
- 2 shirts 4.00
- 4 pairs of socks 1.00
- 4 suits of underclothing 4.00
- 2 pairs of shoes 7.00
- 2 hats 5.00
- 4 cravats 1.50

FOR WIFE—

- 2 dresses \$30.00
- Underclothing 10.00
- 2 pairs shoes 6.00
- 2 hats 8.00
- 4 pairs of stockings 1.50
- 1 dozen handkerchiefs 2.50
- Ribbon, etc. 4.00

FOR SON—

- Suit of clothes, hat shoes, socks and underwear \$30.00

FOR DAUGHTER—

- 2 dresses, underclothes, stockings, hat, shoes, gloves, ribbon, etc. \$30.00

FOR GROCERIES—

- 1 barrel flour \$5.50
- 25 pounds crackers 2.00
- 25 pounds coffee 5.00
- 25 pounds granulated sugar 2.50
- 25 pounds breakfast bacon 3.75
- 1 sack cornmeal 1.00
- Canned fruit 10.00
- Honey and molasses 5.00
- 50 pounds sugar cured ham 7.50
- 25 pounds leaf lard 3.00

Total cost 5 drinks and 5 cigars per day for 1 year \$365.00

The additional money thrown away by the drinker in a few years, together with the loss of time occasioned, if computed, would be sufficient to pay for a pretty good suburban home.

Mayor Murphy says that statistics show that about one-tenth of one per cent. of the local population of the averaged sized town are constantly being maintained in the jails at public expense, because of drunkenness. In a town of 10,000 population this would mean that each day ten people, as a result of intoxication would be found in jail.

The cost of keeping such prisoners at the average estimate, taking into consideration feeding, attendance, surveillance, etc., is 75 cents per day, or \$2,730.00 per year. The average earning capacity of such prisoners will amount to about \$2 per day by taking no consideration all classes of them. Hence ten persons per day means a loss to the industrial activity of a community of \$29 or \$7,330 per year.

When we add the average cost of maintenance of convicted drunkards and the annual loss from their enforced idleness we get a grand total of \$10,035.50 as an average loss each year to a community of 10,000 inhabitants as the result of alcoholism. This proportion which the cost of drunkenness bears to the population is pretty constant no matter how large or small the community.

We should also remember that the above figures do not include the cost of carrying out and enforcing the laws for restricting intoxication, nor the additional cost to the different departments of charities as a result of the arrest and conviction of heads of families. In many instances the drunkard is the father of the family and the principal wage-earner. Often when he gets into the toils of the law his family is left destitute and the remaining members become public charges.—New York American.

ARTICLES OF INCORPORATION AND PROPOSED CHARTER.

—OF— PINE LUMBER COMPANY.

The undersigned, intending and proposing to organize a corporation under the general laws of the State of Florida, relating to the organization of corporations for profit, hereby make and publish the following articles of incorporation and proposed charter:

I. The name of the corporation shall be PINE LUMBER COMPANY, and the principal place of business shall be in the city of Ocala, Marion County, Florida, and at such other places as the Board of Directors may select.

II. The general nature of the business to be transacted is, to conduct a saw mill business, buy, acquire, lease, own, mortgage, sell and dispose of mills, milling plants and all other property necessary and advantageous in carrying on a saw milling business, including lands and timber and timber rights and personal property, and to engage in such other business as is not inconsistent with the general purpose of this organization, and not in violation of the laws of the State of Florida and the United States.

III. The amount of capital stock authorized is the sum of Thirty Thousand Dollars, which will be divided into three hundred shares of the par value of One Hundred Dollars each, and will be paid in by a conveyance to the corporation by H. L. 
