THE LAST DAY OF THE FAIR

The fair went out as it came in, bed in a perfect halo of glory. Everybody was singing its praises. There is no adverse criticism from any quarter. A laurel wreath was patriotically placed on the brows of President George K. Robinson and Secretary David S. Williams, and a crown immortelles on the heads of the In-managers—Mrs. Carney, Mrs. Pyles and Mrs. Gist—and they were decorated from head to foot with blue ribbons.

The officers of the association deserve all praise, and it was given to them in unstinted measure.

Mr. D. A. Miller and Mr. William Hon rendered valued assistance, and this paper is under special obligations to the former for favors shown, which aided it materially in its writing of the fair.

It is also under obligations to Mr. George Crom, one of the judges, for memoranda of the races, which made an accurate description possible.

Yesterday was all bustle and commotion, as the judges were awarding the blue ribbons, and many an exhibit or was made happy thereby.

We have not ascertained to whom the first prize for the best general exhibit was awarded, but at latest accounts it had narrowed down to two exhibitors, viz: Z. C. Chambliss and Perry Edwards. The latter is a colored farmer, and whether or not he secures the blue ribbon, his exhibit was a revelation and extorted favorable comment from every visitor at the fair.

The blue ribbon was awarded to Messrs. Wartmann and Crosby for the best display of citrus fruits. We do not believe that anyone thinks that this award was wrongly given.

This fruit was carefully examined by the judges and especially by Prof. Rolfs of the experiment station at Gainesville. He is a pronounced expert, and is perhaps better acquainted with the oranges grown in Florida than any other man in the state, and he says that without exception this fruit is the finest that he has ever seen. This fruit was grown at the old Harris and Bishop place at Citra, which first carved a reputation for Florida in the markets of the world.

Col. W. N. Camp was awarded the prize for the second best display of citrus fruits, and the quality of his display was very nearly equal to that which carried off the first prize.

Col. Camp took a great interest in the fair, and he or some member of his family had splendid displays in nearly every department.

The corn exhibit elicited more interest, perhaps, than anything else on exhibition on account of the several prizes offered by the banks for the best exhibits of two years and twenty-five ears.

Perry Edwards received the first prize for the twelve ears.

The races Friday were the first and the grand stand was crowded with a sea of Kentlemen.

FLORIDA PROFIT

The following from the San Mateo Item illustrates what can be done on Florida soil, and what many good farmers are doing on the East Coast where land values are bound to increase rapidly.

"Six years ago J. D. Gray bought about an acre of land. He had it cleared, fenced and slanted to different varieties of citrus fruits, setting his trees about fifteen feet apart. Cost of the place, planted, was \$275; six years' care, not exceeding \$50 per year, for labor, fertilizer and all expenses, \$300; total cost at end of six years, \$575. Last year's crop netted him \$226; scattered fruit previous years, \$74; total income, \$300. Total cost to him to date, \$275. Last year's crop paid 10 per cent or \$23.00. If this acre is \$2,000 today it has increased in value each year for the six years nearly \$300 a year or as much as the ordinary farm hand receives for a whole year's labor. The crop should increase rapidly from now on."

POLITICS MAKES NO DIFFERENCE TO US

The demand for the berries was mostly confined to the big hotels. From now on receivers expect that the stock will come in quantities sufficient for all trade purposes. —New York Produce News.
