Under the head of "Weather Reports," we find the following in the Dubuque Globe-Journal, explaining the work which Prof. Daniels, formerly local observer at this place, is doing in his new location:

"Weather Observer Paul Daniels is doing all in his power for the accommodation of the people of Dubuque and vicinity, and his latest move is receiving reports from outside weather stations. These stations include, with Dubuque, Bismarck, S. D., Cheyenne, Chicago, Davenport, Duluth, Huron, Kansas City, Miles City, Mont., Des Moines, Moorhead, Minn., Oklahoma, Omaha, St. Paul, North Platte, Rapid City, St. Louis and Williston, N. D. He will receive a report every day in the year except Sundays and legal holidays, and will issue bulletins every day with the exceptions given. One of these will be for his own office, another for the postoffice, and the others for the newspapers.

"Mr. Daniels will also issue a weather bulletin every day for the accommodation of the public, and it will be found on the wall in the entrance to his office, over Rute's drug store. Figures are marked on this map, on which the names of the stations enumerated in the foregoing are to be found. The first figures show the temperature of the station; the second the condition of the barometer, and the third the precipitation. An arrow shows the direction of the wind; and the map also gives the forecast and a synopsis of the weather for the ensuing twenty-four hours.

"Mr. Daniels also issues a river bulletin every morning, showing the danger line, height of water, and the change in the past twenty-four hours. The stations on the bulletin are Dubuque, Davenport, Omaha, St. Paul and St. Louis, but he will add McGregor, Keokuk and another city.

"Mr. Daniels has had his office carpeted, an electric light put in, and other improvements made. Dubuque is now a station of the first class."


