Rapid Telegraphing

Messrs. Crehore and Squier, the inventors of the synchronograph (fully described in Pathfinder No. 102) for rapid telegraphing, made another practical test of their system in Washington last week. The test showed that messages could be transmitted at the rate of 2,000 words a minute with perfect accuracy. A report has just come from Vienna that an electrical engineer there named Pollok has succeeded in telegraphing 60,000 words an hour, but the synchronograph doubles this speed.—Washington Pathfinder.

E. C. Palmer has struck it rich—at least for awhile. He has been appointed civil engineer at the Poplar Indian agency, Montana, at a salary of about \$125 per month. Not a bad plum to pick at this time of the year. Two Elevators Burn.

Flandreau, S. D., May 13.—The Car-gill elevator, valued at \$2,500, with 1,400 bushels of grain, and the Parks elevator, valued at \$2,000, with 4,000 bushels of grain, at Afton, burned to the ground last night. The Car-gill house carried insurance, but the Parks did not, and was a total loss. It is believed that the fire was of incendiary origin.

A Peculiar Case

Chicago, May 13.—The jury to-day acquitted Thomas Crosby, aged 14 years, and convicted his mother of manslaughter for killing Deputy Sheriff Nye, who was shot by the boy when the officer tried to break in the door of the house to serve a writ of ejection.

The Strike Spreading.

Buffalo, N. Y., May 13.—Every coal and ore dock in this city is now tied up; the coal heavers having gone out in support of the grain scoopers, and there are no special indications that the end of the contest is in view.

Hon. A. H. Laughlin of Lisbon will probably be the superintendent of census for North Dakota. Laughlin, it is understood, will have the support of Congressman Spalding and Senators Hanthorn and McCumber, and this will secure him the appointment.—Fargo Call.
