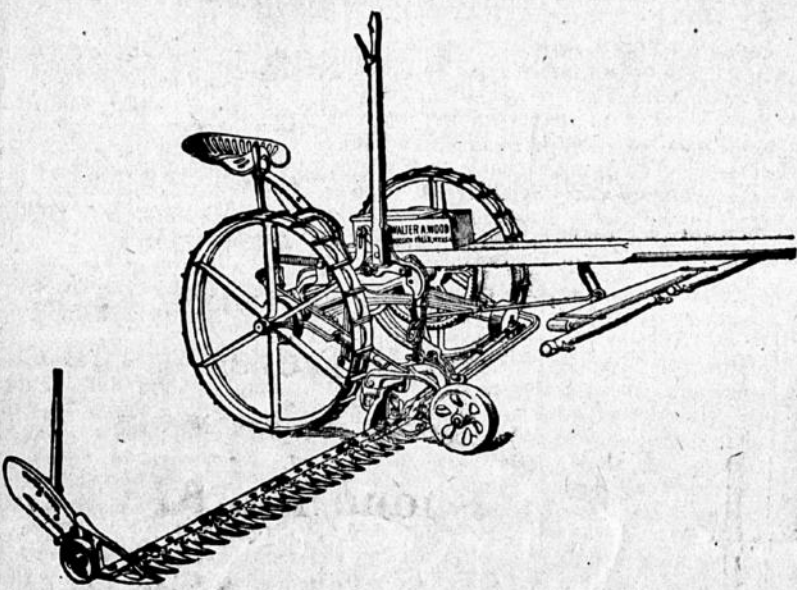

There was a large crowd of women and children in front of the hotel and they had to make a fast move for the inside of the hotel to get out of the way of the horse. Luckily they escaped and no one was injured, the two men in the rig having escaped with a slight shaking.

Visited Asylum at Jamestown

C. E. Davis, A. Omstad and C. H. Smith.

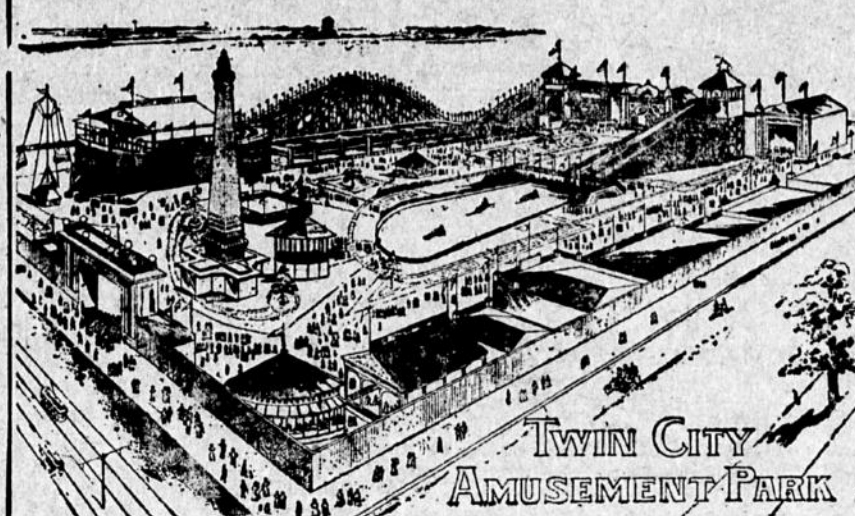
