

LIVE STOCK BOARD MEET

Adopted Rules For The Prevention of contagious Diseases—Named Twelve Assistants

The state live stock sanitary board held its adjourned meeting at the state capitol at Bismarck. All members of the board were present and with them were Dr. W. F. Crewe of Devils Lake, the executive of the board and Dr. R. H. Treacy, inspector of the bureau of animal industry. The members of the board went over the matter of rules and regulations governing the importation of live stock to the state, the treatment of glanders and other contagious diseases and decided on all matters in the prevention and treatment of contagion. The rules are similar to those adopted by the federal department for the government officials will work together for the enforcement of better sanitary regulations.

Dr. Crewe will make his headquarters at Devils Lake and will direct the operation of his assistants from there. The board selected a number of assistants who have been authorized to work under the direction of the inspector and they will receive their per diem and expenses when under the orders of the executive officer. The board also passed resolutions giving federal inspectors the same authority as the state officers.
