R.R. WRECKS IN

FAST MAIL ON THE PENNSYLVA-NIA ROAD RUNS INTO A FREIGHT WRECK.

Four Persons are Injured in the Smashup.-Three Men Injured in a Georgia Wreck.—Great Northern Train Wrecked in Montana.

Pittsburg, Pa., Dec. 23.—Four persons were injured, heavy property loss was sustained and three tracks of the Pennsylvania railroad blockaded for the night by two wrecks near Bolivar, Pa., fifty-eight miles west of

An extra freight train left the rails of Track No. 1 because of a broken rail, it is believed, and twenty cars were smashed and piled up over Tracks No. 2 and 3.

Almost immediately after the accident to the freight the Chicago mail train running at a high speed to make up lost time reached the point on track No. 2 and plowed through the debris with terrific force.

Every one on the train was badly jolted and shaken up, many of the passengers being thrown from their seats. None of the passenger cars left the track, but a number of windows were broken.

At the office of the company here it is stated that one mail clerk was severely bruised and that three passengers were cut and bruised, No one on the freight train was injured.

¹ Tallapoosa, Ga., Dec. 22.—Train No. 23 on the Southern, bound from Atlanta for Birmington, ran into an open switch at this point, killing Engineer Downey and injuring two firemen. None of the passengers was injured. It is thought the switch had been tampered with.

Glendive, Mont., Dec. 23.—Derailed by some obstruction on the track, Northern Pacific Train No. 3 went into the ditch near Beach, N. D., last evening. It is reported that no passengers were seriously hurt. One report has it that Fireman C. J. Parker was killed: another that he was badly hurt. The track was badly torn up and the engine was damaged. The

rear coaches did not leave the track. No. 5 and No. 1 are coming around the wreck on a temporary track and will not be much delayed.

CRASH ON THE SOO.

Baggageman Killed and Six Men Are injured Near Kensington.

Kensingten, Minn., Dec. 21.-One man was killed and six injured in a wreck on the Soo line just west of here. The passenger train which left Minneapolis at 7:40 p. m., bound for the Pacific coast, struck a broken rail three miles west of here at 1:15 a. m. The engine was derailed, the baggage car rolled down the embankment and two cars just behind left the track.

MILK MEN ARE INDICTED

FIFTEEN TRUE BILLS CHARGING CONSPIRACY RETURNED.

Four Firms and Eleven Individuals in Net-Act Comes as a Sur-

Chicago, Dec. 23.—Fifteen indictments against persons and corporations comprised in the alleged milk trust were returned Saturday by the grand jury. The true bills charge conspiracy to do an illegal act in restraint of public trade. The penalty for corporations is a maximum fine of \$2,000 and for individuals a maximum fine of \$2,000, or imprisonment in the penitentiary for five years, or both. Seven big milk dealing concerns in Chicago are affected by the indictments.

Four of these, being corporations, were indictable, and indictments were returned against the corporations as well as against their officers. They are the Borden Condensed Milk company, the Bowman Dairy company, the Kee & Chapell Dairy company and the Ira J. Mix Dairy company. The other three concerns affected—P. A. Newton & Bro., Yore Bros., and Sidney Wanzer & Sons—being copartnerships, were not indictable. Indictments were returned in these cases against the members of the copartnerships.

The indictments came as a surprise to the persons affected, some of whom had voluntarily testified before the grand jury, waiving immunity, which would otherwise shelter them now. Only one paragraph in the grand jury report was devoted to the milk cases. This paragraph said that during a comprehensive investigation into the local milk business what the jury believed to be indisputable evidence of a conspiracy to act in restraint of trade had been presented, and indictments had been returned accordingly.

DUMMY SANTA STARTS BIG FIRE.

Loss in Springfield, Ill., Originating in Window Figure Is \$150,000.

Springfield, Ill., Dec. 23.—A disastrous fire originated at 9:40 o'clock Saturday morning from a dummy Santa Claus in the show window of the Johnston-Hatcher company's department store, 628-30 East Adams street. The store was filled with Christmas shoppers and in four minutes the building was untenantable.

The fire spread to the buildings adjoining on the west and for a time threatened to destroy the six-story department store of the John Bressmer company at 614-618 East Adams street, but the solid fire walls of the building prevented its spiend. The losses aggregate \$150,000.

Detroit, Mich., Dec. 23.-Fire gutted the six-story brick building at the corner of Jefferson and Woodward avenue occupied by Edwin S. George, fur dealer, and D. E. Kellogg, wholesale milliner. The total loss is estimated at about \$140,000.

CONVICTED OF LAND FRAUD.

H. Clay Wyatt, of Lawton, Okla., Found Guilty by Jury.

Kansas City, Mo., Dec. 22.-H. Clay Wyatt, of Lawton, Okla., was found guilty of conspiracy to defraud the government of land in the Rosebud reservation in South Dakota by a jury in the federal court here. The extreme penalty is two years in prison or a fine of \$10,000 or both. Sentence was deferred.

Wyatt was charged with inducing old soldiers to enter homesteads on the reservation land, and then sell relinquishments for about \$500. Wyatt and his confederates then sold the relinquishments for from \$100 to \$600 advance. Several quarter sections of land were disposed before the government agents made the arrests.

Mark Twain a Loser.

New York, Dec. 23.-A petition in bankruptcy has been filed against the Plasmon company of which Samuel L. Clemens (Mark Twain) is acting president. The company manufactures milk products and is a branch of an English company. It is stated that Mr. Clemens invested something like \$25,000 in the company which is now bankrupt. The company's liabilities are \$27,000 and its nominal assets

Edward Price Dead. Omaha, Neb., Dec. 23.-Edward Price of New York city, first husband of Fanny Davenport, the actress, died in Omaha of pneumonia. Mr. Price was the manager of the Grand Mogul company, a Klaw & Erlanger attraction. Mr. Price was a thirty-third degree Mason and the funeral will be under the auspices of the Masons.
