STATE AID FOR HIGH SCHOOLS

A NUMBER OF SCHOOLS IN STATE HAVE BEEN ADMITTED TO CLASS ENTITLED TO STATE AID.

Bismarck, N. D. Jan. 16, 1908 —Supt. Stockwell gives out the following statement as to high schools classified and entitled to state aid since the October meeting of the State High School Board: First Class—Casselton. Second Class—Ellendale, Page, Towner, Crystal. Third Class—Inkster, Churches Ferry, Gilby, Granville, Leeds, Reynolds, Rugby, Velva, Webster, Courtenay, Milnor, Aneta, Buffalo Steele, Washburn, Forest River and Milton.

There are eight or ten applications for classification pending, which will be acted upon in the near future. At present there are thirty-three first class schools, seventeen second class schools and nineteen third class schools, making a total of sixty-nine classified and aided high schools. The state aid, amounting to \$800.00 to first class, \$500.00 to second class and \$300.00 to third class schools has been apportioned but owing to the heavy drain upon the state treasury this past year, the warrants for this aid have not been issued and may not be prior to March 1, 1908.
