CANDIDATE FOR RE-ELECTION TO THE OFFICE OF RAILROAD COMMISSIONER.

Simon Westby, railway commissioner and candidate for the republican nomination for the same office this year, was in the city a few days ago and gave the Globe-Gazette some of his views on the work of this commission.

Mr. Westby stated that there are far more important features to be considered by the commission than the making of rate schedules, both passenger and freight. He thought that the safety of the traveling public was far more important than the above.
