


## North Dakota Governors



NEHEMIAH G. ORDWAY—1880-1884.

Nehemiah G. Ordway, eighth territorial governor of Dakota, succeeded Acting Governor Hand in July, 1880. He was born at Warner, N. H., in 1828 and served as sergeant at arms in the national house of representatives for twelve years. During General Ordway's term as governor the Dakota "boom settlements" took place and many counties were organized. Many charges of corruption in the location of county seats and other matters in connection with the boom period were made against officials. Governor Ordway did not escape these charges, though nothing culpable was proved against him. His activity in securing the removal of the territorial capital to Bismarck made him unpopular in the southern half of the big territory. Governor Ordway invested largely in Dakota lands. He returned to Washington, but after the division of the territory and the admission of the two states he sought election to the United States senate from North Dakota without success.

## OWN SHEEP SLASH PRIEST?

THAT IS POLICE THEORY OF A VICIOUS ATTACK.

Rev. John Tomaszewski Badly Wounded as He Sits in His Chicago Rectory.

Chicago, Sept. 18.—Police investigation of an attack in which the Rev. John Tomaszewski was wounded as he sat in his rectory at the All Saints' Independent Catholic church at 9 Lubec street, disclosed that the congregation is rent by dissensions, which are believed by the police to have precipitated the assault. The failure of the clergyman to identify his assailant has complicated the case. Threats, it is said, had been made recently against him by disgruntled members of the congregation, and these are now being investigated by the police.

The attack occurred as Father Tomaszewski was sitting at the table in the rectory. A man wearing black whiskers, which are believed to have been false, entered the room, struck the priest on the head with some blunt object and then slashed him twice with a knife or some other sharp instrument, leaving his victim faint and bleeding. Mrs. Anna Slominski, the housekeeper of the rectory, discovered the clergyman and gave an alarm that brought the people of the entire neighborhood to the church premises.

Dr. C. W. Cassidy, 1081 North Robey street, who attended the wounded clergyman, said Friday that his injuries are not dangerous.

There has been considerable controversy recently between the clergyman who was assaulted and some of the parishioners over financial questions, and also over the management of the St. Anthony Independent Catholic hospital. The founding of St. Bernard's hospital and old people's home as an independent institution by Dr. Anthony Edward Malachowski, a former teacher at the All Saints' Independent church school, caused further friction.

## FLEET SAILS FROM AUSTRALIA.

Manila Will Be the Next Stepping Place of American Battleships.

Albany, Western Australia, Sept. 18.—The American Atlantic fleet, under the command of Rear Admiral Sperry, left here at five o'clock Friday afternoon for Manila, 1,600 miles away, where it is due to arrive October 2 or 3. The flagship Connecticut did not leave with the other vessels, but she departed at midnight, and overtook the rest of the fleet Saturday. She was delayed by coaling. The fleet is making nine knots an hour.

The delay of one day here was caused by the unreliability of the chartered colliers, a circumstance which in war time might be attended with most serious results.

Rear Admiral Sperry has dispatched a message to Alfred Deakin, the premier of the commonwealth, in reply to the communication sent by the premier Thursday wishing the American visitors good speed on the continuance of their voyage to home waters.

## ACCUSED OFFICER KILLS SELF.

Major-General Luard Commits Suicide Because of Charge.

Waterbury, Eng., Sept. 18.—Major Gen. Charles Edward Luard, retired, whose wife was mysteriously murdered near London August 24, committed suicide Friday by throwing himself in front of a railroad train. His body was found later close to a railroad crossing not far from Waterbury.

Gen. Luard had been a guest of Col. Charles Edward Warde, M. P., at Teston. He left the house Friday and, going directly to the railroad, threw himself in front of an oncoming train. Col. Warde found a letter from Gen. Luard saying his body would be found under the train. He explained that such awful accusations had been made against him that he could no longer stand the strain. The general had received letters accusing him with having murdered his wife.

Argues That Christ Was an Aryan. Oxford, England, Sept. 18.—The International Congress of the History of Religions was aroused to a high pitch of excitement Thursday by a paper presented by Prof. Paul Haupt of Johns Hopkins university, Baltimore, in which he endeavored to demonstrate by a process of ethnological reasoning that Christ was not a Jew, but an Aryan.

Big Conference Held. St. Paul, Minn., Sept. 18.—The twenty-ninth annual conference of the Norwegian-Danish Methodist church was held here. This conference covers the states of Minnesota, Wisconsin, Illinois, Michigan, North and South Dakota, Nebraska and Kansas, and is the governing body for 75 churches.

Kills Landlady and Self. South Bethlehem, Pa., Sept. 18.—While in a jealous rage William Beiser, aged 38 years, a steel worker, Friday shot and killed Mrs. Sarah Boyer, his boarding house mistress, and then killed himself by firing six shots into his body.

Countess in Auto Crash. London, Sept. 18.—A news agency dispatch from Vienna says that the Countess and Countess Szechenyi have suffered an automobile accident in Hungary. Their injuries, however, were confined to shock and a few bruises.



# State Normal School

## MAYVILLE, NORTH DAKOTA

The sole purpose is to train teachers and principals for the elementary schools. Mayville is a quiet, wholesome school town located in the famous Goose River Valley, the richest section of the state. Tuition is free. Registration and library fees are small. Living expenses are low. There are two courses of study: a four-year course for eighth grade graduates and a one-year course for graduates of first class high schools.
