## SEN. McCUMBER LAUDS HANNA

SENATOR McCUMBER ACCOMPANIES  
CANDIDATES THROUGH CASS—

Fargo, Oct. 10.—Senator P. J. McCumber, undoubtedly the best orator in the state of North Dakota and one of the best in the nation, has given some of his best efforts to Cass county. He accompanied the candidates and statesmen who toured Cass county during the first three days of this week and upon him fell the bulk of talk on national issues.

These issues in his hands very excellently handled and the people of Cass county simply went wild over the splendid addresses delivered by Senator McCumber.

As Page Senator McCumber told the people why he wanted Mr. Hanna in the lower house of congress as he has done at several of the places visited by the party.

He said that he needs just such a man in the lower house of congress to help him fight for the federal inspection of grain which he has been carrying practically alone for the past five years.
