### Miss Martell Dead

Miss Alice Martell died at the home of her uncle George W. Nohle of near Alexander last Thursday from tuberculosis. The deceased was born in Lewis county, New York twenty-three years ago and had resided in McKenzie county the past year. She held a state certificate in New York and had taught in that state and was a teacher in the McKenzie county schools last year. Miss Martell leaves a mother, three brothers and three sisters all residing in New York with the exception of a brother C. F. Martell who resides near Alexander and who took the body to New York Saturday.

### District Court

The damage case of M. B. Dowd vs. A. L. McGinnity has been holding the attention of district court the past three days the plaintiff asking for \$9,500 damages. This case comes from Tioga and the alleged assault occurred May 26, 1910.

Since that time the defendant claims that he has been a physical and mental wreck and has been unable to do any work or transact ordinary business routine. The plaintiff was on the stand Monday afternoon and his mind seemed lucid up to the time the assault occurred and when questioned on events that occurred at that time and after his answers were rambling and unconnected. Dr's Slobie, Perkins and McGregor were introduced as experts on the physical and mental condition of the plaintiff in the course of the trial and testimony was taken on the treatment he received at Rochester, Minn., in the Mayo sanitarium at that place.

The chief cause of Dowd's mental trouble seemed to result from a blow over the eye and an examination by the Mayo Brothers resulted in an opinion by them that if the patient was operated upon fatal results would ensue. D.C. Greenleaf of Minot appeared for the plaintiff and Attorney Blood of the law firm of Noble, Blood and Adamson of Minot, for the defense. The jury returned a verdict of \$342, in favor of the plaintiff.

Other cases at this term were Davidson vs. Olson which was to decide the ownership and identity of one buckskin or bay mare. The finding was for the plaintiff and the damage was fixed at \$200, he having asked for \$350.

Hendrickson vs. Jones settled out of court. Bruegger Mercantile Co., vs. McCutcheon, continued.

### Young Indian Drowned

A boat containing Mrs. Tom Ememny Heath, Mrs. Minnie Bear and a young son of Tom White, Martin Matlo and William Fishing Bear, was capsized in the Missouri river at Kasmer. Martin Matlo succeeded in holding onto the boat and finally rescued every member save the young son of Tom White, who was drowned. The Indians were more dead than alive when they were taken ashore.
