**MME. RYDER AND THE LISTEMANN'S WIN UNBOUNDED FAVOR IN FRI-DAY EVENINGS RECITAL**

Carrying his violin in a case that witnessed the storms of passage and wearing his years a jauntily as in youth Bernhard Listemann and the artists that formed the remainder of the talented trio, won all hearts of the high class order of their recital given at the opera house last Friday evening.  
 Miss Virginia Listemann possesses a voice sweet and appealing and cultured to a wonderful degree. Her singing is marked with a splendid stage presence and every note comes fourth sweet, clear and wonderfully controlled. The audience will not soon forget her singing of "The Honeysuckle" and the "Birthday Song" in which she displayed her talents at the best.  
 The playing of Madam Theodora Sturkow-Ryder was characterized by grace and daintiness and the smooth, brilliant touch of the young artist displayed the true musician in the highest type. Mme. Ryders work is fully abreast of that of the others of the talented company and the years hold a rich promise for her in her chosen profession.
