### WHAT "FREE SUGAR" MEANS

Under the above caption the Larrowe Milling Company of Detroit, Mich., is sending out a leaflet emphasizing the harm that would be done by free sugar. This leaflet reads as follows:  
"Ruin of beet sugar industry and 1.0 more dried beet pulp.  
"No more beet molasses for the prepared food manufacturers.  
"Nearly one million tons of beet sugar and Louisiana cane sugar taken out of the market, with the probability of an advance in world's prices for sugar as soon as the home industry is dead.  
sugar business thrown into the hands of five or six men in the east who control the refining of foreign sugar. They are the ones who will be benefited by "free sugar."  
"A loss to the government in revenue of over fifty million dollars per annum, which must be made up by other taxation.  
"As the household consumption of sugar hardly exceeds forty pounds a year for each individual the greatest possible saving to each person by taking off the duty cannot exceed 60 cents; and even this will not be realized when the domestic sugar competition is killed and world's prices advanced. Is 'free sugar' worth while?—American Sugar Industry.
