NEW ORDER FOR WATER USERS

NOTICE SENT OUT OF POSTPONEMENT OF ALL CHARGES AND PENALTIES UNTIL JUNE 1

Williston, N. D., Feb. 27, 1914.
To All Water Users, and Directors of Water Users' Association:

The project office is advised by telegraph today that the Reclamation Commission has passed the following resolution:

"Resolved that the building charges for all projects, except Sunnyside, falling due on March first, April first and May first and all building charges which have been postponed to March first nineteen fourteen, under previous orders of the Commission, be and the same are hereby postponed until June first nineteen fourteen; that all project offices be notified by telegram to that effect, announcing that all penalties heretofore accrued under the order of July twenty first are remitted, also stating that this order is made in anticipation of the early passage of pending legislation providing for a complete readjustment of the terms of payment."

It is also desired to advise you that an announcement will be made soon of a basis of operations for 1914 and thereafter. The terms of the notice cannot be definitely given at this time, but the water users are assured that their interests will be served and that the terms will probably be more favorable than any announced in the past.

The Supervisor of Irrigation writes that as soon as practicable after a plan is announced, he will come to Williston and go over project matters in general with the water users.

With these good things in prospect, the water users are urged to make an early and as much preparation as possible for a larger and better crop the coming season.

CHARLES TAYLOR DEAD

Minot, March 3.—A wire received at the state offices of the Rogers Lumber Co., here, today, announced the sudden death of Charles F. Taylor, formerly superintendent of the Rogers lumber yards here, at Edmonton, Alberta, yesterday of heart failure.

Mr. Taylor was one of the best known lumbermen in North Dakota. Before going to Edmonton, where he established a line of yards for himself, he was with the Rogers company for fifteen years. Mr. Taylor left here about two years ago. He was a member of Minot lodge 1089, B. P. O. Elks, and was affiliated with other fraternal organizations. He is survived by his wife and two daughters, Nellie and Alberta, who was the valedictorian of her class upon graduation at the Minot high school. Both Mr. Taylor's parents are dead, but the remains will probably be shipped to his old home in Iowa for burial.

MRS. SCOTT DIES

Mrs. Scott, wife of Doctor Scott of Ray, died last Friday night. Mrs. Scott had been suffering for a number of years with cancer of the breast. A short time ago this affected the liver and death came within a few days. Funeral services were held in Ray and the remains were shipped to the old home in the east for interment.


