Printed notices and acceptances will be ready and will be mailed to individual water users within a few days. This letter is to advise you of developments in order that you may take such measures as you deem best to inform your water users and to encourage each to prepare for cultivation and irrigation as large a portion of his acreage as possible. These very favorable terms have been made in a co-operative effort to stimulate development of the irrigable lands and it is hoped a larger responsive effort will be made than at any time in the past.
